

Tripoli will not be a successful

Italian colony if the Italians attempt to manage its affairs from Rome. They must fist find the right man to put in charge, then turn him loose and let him handle the affairs of Tripoli. The French made the mistake of directing Algerian business from Paris, and the result was much trouble and disappointment. The French, moreover, tried the "strong arm" method with the natives, and to-day France holds Algeria by her troops, whereas in British colonies troops are not more numerous than policeman are at home, and discharge much the same functions. If Italy is to succeed she must enlist the Arabs as allies, prove to them that they have as much to gain as the Italians themselves by making Tripoli a garden land, and teach them the arts of the Tablets after five years of suffer-European farmer, shepherd and vinedresser, for these are the arts that must make Tripoli a great colony if it is to be rescued from barbarism.
