FACIAL MASSAGE AID

Respiratory Apparatus Enables One to Breathe Under Water.

A device that will be found of assistance in methods of facial massage, where the patient is required to immerse her face in liquid for a period, has been patented by a Washington man. It enables the wearer to breathe freely with both nose and mouth under the surface of the liquid. A little clip fits over the nostrils and holds them closely enough to keep out the water, or whatever the preparation may be. A little tube has a mouth-

piece attachment with a bit to hold between the teeth and a rubber shield that fits closely around the mouth. With her nostrils pinched shut and this respirator in her mouth, a woman may rest her face in a basin of massage liquid for as long as is necessary to have the skin thoroughly softened by it and prepared for the manual work. She breathes through the mouth, of course, and the air comes in through the tube.

FELLOWSHIP FOR TORONTO DOCTOR

Dr. A. S. Moorehead Was Awarded F. R.C.S. by London Medical Body.

Dr. A. S. Moorehead of Toronto has been awarded the final fellowship of the Royal College of Surgeons. The young Toronto doctor who has won so signal a distinction from the great London medical school is Dr. Andrew Samuel Moorehead, youngest son of Mr. Thomas Moorehead, born some thirty years ago on the town line near Uxbridge. He received his secondary education at Markham High School and came to Toronto University, graduating from the Medical College in 1906 after an excellent course, being a medalist in his graduation year. He then spent six months in Buffalo hospitals, was house surgeon in Toronto General Hospital for a year and a half, and then went to St. Mark's Hospital, London, England, where he was also house surgeon. Dr. Moorehead holds the degrees of L.R.C.P. and F.R.C.S. and his final distinction of F.R.C.S.
