Mr. McQueen was a staunch Presbyterian and in politics, a reformer. He was honest and upright in dealings with his fellow men and will be missed a great deal among his wide circle of friends.

Thr deceased was buried in Swinton Park Cemetery, his pastor Rev. Mr. Matheson officiating. To the relatives, especially to the late widow is extended the sympathy of this community.
