MARKDALE IS IN ARMS.

From The Toronto Star. We fear there is serious business afoot. It is to be hoped that, without causing unnecessary alarm along the coasts of England, or arousing vain hopes in Ulster, we may mention the fact that Markdale, Ont., is under arms!

The young men of Markdale are drilling two nights each week under the instructions of a special officer sent up from Toronto by Col. Sam Hughes. And Markdale, you must remember, is the home town of Dr. Sproule, who but recently resigned as Grand Master of the Orangemen of British North America.

Is Markdale going to declare war on behalf of Ulster?

The simple facts about Markdale's present military ardor seem innocent enough as set forth in this week's Shelburne Economist, but we have searched this week's Markdale Standard in vain for reference to the matter. Is this studied concealment? The story in the Shelburne Economist is told in words so plausible that they would deceive anybody but us. The explanation given is that Markdale has been promised an armory by the Government, that Company F of the 31st Regiment in that town is being filled to strength, and that advantage has been taken of Col. Hughes' offer to loan a drill sergeant to any rural regiment that will use one. That sounds reasonable enough, but when you hear Ulster talking fight, and when you learn that the young men of Dr. Sproule's town are under arms, drilling two nights each week, what are you to think?

Take the neighboring town of Durham, situated on a branch of the same trout stream. Does Dr. Sproule live there? He does not. Is Durham in arms? It is not. From this week's issue of the Chronicle of that town, we see that Durham has an armory, a new one, and only uses it as a wind-break. It was built by the Liberal Government, which the Chronicle detested, and not by the present Administration, which it admires. It says:

"We have an armory put here by the late Government, and while we accepted the building, so that a slice of the Government money might be spent in town, we have yet failed to find a man who can conscientiously say that an expenditure of \$10,000 for military purposes in Durham was a wise outlay. Not so about the post-office, however."

Although the Durham post-office has really nothing to do with militarism in Markdale, we may pause here for a moment to explain that it is a very different matter from the Durham armory. It isn't built yet. It was promised by the detested late Government, and cannot be withheld by the admired present one. Unlike the armory, such a building would, the Chronicle says, be a benefit to every citizen, besides, "the Government is putting up new buildings, and if Durham can get a piece of the Government money, she has just as good a right to it as other towns."

That's true enough. But consider the peace that reigns in Durham and the war-din that resounds in Markdale. Are we wrong in suspecting that the unrest in Ulster explains it? Or can it be that an army in a town, like a navy on the sea, makes for peace? Is Markdale ailing to get an armory or arming to get drilled? Or are her thoughts those solemn and chaste peace thoughts which animate the soul of Durham—that the Government is spending money, and Markdale has as much right to a slice of it as any other town?

PLENTY OF TEACHERS SAID TO BE IN SIGHT.

A circular letter issued by the Education Department reads in part as follows; "About 1,100 legally qualified Public School teachers will graduate from the Normal Schools of Education at the end of the current sessions. Of these about 200 holding second class certificates, with at least one years experience, will be available immediately after Easter. The remaining 900, holding first and second class certificates, will be available after midsummer. All of 1,100 have pledged themselves to teach in Ontario at least the first year of their experience, and under the regulations are entitled to preference over teachers with lower qualifications."

EXPLOSION AT SINGHAMPTON.

Victor Ross, late proprietor of the Exchange Hotel, was mixed up in an acetylene explosion which might have cost him his life. Something went wrong with the lighting plant of the hotel, and in the hope of removing the trouble Ross went into the basement, taking with him a lighted lantern. Scarcely had he opened the generator when an explosion occurred, the released gas becoming ignited by the flame of the lantern. The report attracted the attention of those in the hotel, who hurried to his assistance and in a few minutes had him out of the basement and free from the debris that had been generally mixed up. Fortunately, his injuries were not as serious as they might have been, consisting of a number of painful burns on the head, face and neck. How he escaped death is difficult to understand. The explosion shook the building, and raised the upper floors, causing chairs to tumble about.—Creemore Star

DECEIVED THE WIDOW. While specially commanded by the scriptures not to afflict any widow, Thomas Long of Warton made a widow his prey, and his worldly vision is now encompassed by the thick stone walls of the Walkerton jail under whose confining influence he will dwell for the next sixty days, for the part he played in the transaction. The victim of Long's operations is Mrs. Mary Finn, of Warton, and his manner of performing is more interesting than commendable. After boarding with the lady for nearly two weeks without going through the formality of paying, Long proceeded to borrow 70c. from the woman on the strength of the statement that he had about \$500.00 in the Molson's Bank at Owen Sound, and wanted to go and draw some of his pile. After getting the cash from the woman, he invited her son, Melville, to accompany him to Owen Sound, when he would pay him from the fund he was to draw. Melville consequently bought a ticket and boarded the train, but missing Long shortly after starting the journey, and failing to locate him in any of the cars, he became suspicious and getting off at a nearby station, caught the next train home. A charge of false pretense was subsequently lodged against Long, and on being apprehended by Constable Ward, he admitted having jumped off the train and blown the 70c. in for whisky. Arraigned before Magistrate Miller he confessed to having lied to the widow, and acknowledged that he had no money in any bank. As a penalty for such behavior, the Magistrate sent him to the cells for sixty days, Constable Ward arriving in Walkerton with the prisoner on Monday.—Bruce Herald and Times.
