ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION.

Mr. James H. Coleridge, on concluding his long, and eminently successful career as teacher of the school in S.S. No. 13, Egremont, was honored last Friday evening, March 1st, by the children, young people and parents of the section, many of whom met at his home, to show their appreciation of his services, and to express kind wishes for the future welfare of himself and his family.

Trustee David McKelvie called the meeting to order. Wm. L. Dixon was chosen chairman. He called on Bert Eccles to read the address which is as follows:
