A SERIOUS ACCIDENT

Two Rigs Crash Into Each Other and Are Badly Smashed

HORSE FRIGHTENED BY AUTO

Both Drivers Thrown Out and Injured

This Wednesday morning, we were an eye-witness to a bad smash-up, which resulted in serious injury to two of our citizens, Mr. John Hunter, of the corner store, and Mr. Duncan McKenzie, an up-town resident.

It happened so suddenly that even a most observant spectator would fail to grasp every detail of the occurrence. Mr. Hunter was driving south along Garafraxa street, and Mr. McKenzie was coming in the opposite direction. Just as both were nearly opposite Mr. Allen's blacksmith shop, an auto, belonging to Mr. Cox, proprietor of the pool-room, was coming out of the lane alongside the shop.

Mr. McKenzie's horse evidently took fright at the sound of it, and shied over towards Mr. Hunter's cart, with which it became mixed up. The cart was upset, and Mr. Hunter was thrown violently on the sidewalk, when the horse started south. Mr. McKenzie emerged from the mix-up, and the horse ran fiercely towards the north, one of the shafts being broken in two about the middle. In front of Lenahan's store, the wheel struck a telephone post, but still Mr. McKenzie held to his position, using his best efforts to control the infuriated animal.

It seems that the next jolt was caused by the broken shaft dragging along the street, and partly overturning the buggy as it caught in the ground. Opposite Burnett's store, the remaining shaft became detached and the horse made off, the buggy, so far as we could judge, running part way on to the sidewalk, and then slewing back on to the road, when Mr. McKenzie fell forcibly to the ground.

Mr. Hunter received a very severe blow on the head, and seems to have been injured about the hip and perhaps internally. Mr. McKenzie received a very nasty gash under the right eye, but though a man of perhaps seventy years of age, he seems to have otherwise escaped severe injuries.

The auto stopped immediately on seeing the trouble. It seems to us it hadn't reached the sidewalk. Mr. McKenzie's horse was stopped by Mr. Atkinson and Mr. Finney, at the top of the hill, and Mr. Hunter's in Bentinck, two and one-half miles west of town.

This service will give Canadians from Detroit east the opportunity of a one night's ride to one of the most popular seashore resorts on the Atlantic coast and will offer new fields for the tourist and summer resorter. Splendid hotel accommodation is at present available and it is needless to say that this new mecca for Canadians will be a popular one. The cost of fares to New London will be the same as to Old Orchard and sea-side resorts on the Maine coast.
