Rules and Regulations

Durham Free Library

In accordance with the Statute governing Free Libraries, it is hereby announced that the following rules and regulations have been adopted by the Board of Durham Free Library for the guidance of readers and the public and the same will go into force on and after 1st of June next.

Rules and Regulations—1. Any ratepayer or resident of Durham and any non-resident who has paid in advance an annual fee of fifty cents (50c) will be entitled to borrow books upon signing a form of application which will be supplied by the Librarian, but the privileges accorded the holder of a card may be revoked at discretion of the Board of Management.

2. Each borrower, on payment of five cents (5c) will be supplied with a card which will entitle him to take only one volume at a time from the Library; and if the borrower desires to do so he may deposit (5c) to retain a book lent out when it comes in, but such retention shall not exceed three days.

3. A book marked "7 day book" may be retained only one week, all others two weeks. The latter classes may be renewed unless applications for them are in.

4. A fine of two cents a day shall be paid on each book or periodical which is not returned according to the provisions of the preceding rules and no other book will be delivered to the party incurring the fine until such fine is paid.

5. Should a book not be returned within 14 days after the expiration of the prescribed time, an additional charge of 25c will be added for costs of collection, and if the book be not returned within 6 weeks of date of issue, legal proceedings will be immediately taken to recover the value of same with all fines and charges.

6. Writing in books and periodicals and on papers is prohibited and all injuries to them and all losses must be promptly adjusted to the satisfaction of the Book Committee.

7. Abuse of the privileges of the Library will be followed by suspension.

8. Except in Fiction classes, members may have access to the stacks.

9. Books of reference may not be taken from the Library.

10. Rules and Regulations are subject to amendment.

Durham, May 10th, 1912.

TWO OWEN SOUND MEN IN TROUBLE

Two well-known Owen Sound young men, William and Norman Martindale, who have been living in Toronto for some time, have become involved in the disappearance of Anna Hailes, aged 18, who later committed suicide in Detroit a few days ago. William Martindale has disappeared, together with a Toronto restaurant keeper, A. D. Richards, who was directly responsible for taking the girl away. Norman Martindale is in the hands of the Detroit police.

The young men are sons of Mr. Gilbert Martindale, of the West Hill, who is at present in Toronto looking into the affair.

It is alleged that the young woman ran away from Toronto with Richards and posing as man and wife they registered at 52 Bagley street, Detroit. The girl had been employed in Richards' restaurant in Toronto. Forty-eight hours after the disappearance of the couple, Wm. Martindale, with whom Richards was interested in real estate matters, located them in Detroit and went there in company with the girl's father supposedly in an endeavor to induce the girl to return home. When Miss Hailes learned that her parents were cognizant of the position in which she had placed herself, she became despondent and late in the afternoon while Richards was absent from the Bagley avenue house, the girl swallowed a dose of carbolic acid. Her moans attracted attention and the police ambulance was hurriedly summoned, but the unfortunate girl died while on the way to the hospital.

The next day after entangling himself in a lot of misstatements concerning the circumstances leading up to the suicide of Anna Hailes who took carbolic acid, Norman Martindale, younger brother of Wm. Martindale, who came to Detroit from Toronto to "square things" for the girl's betrayer, offered to make clean breast of the whole affair before Captain Alphonse Baker. Young Martindale's statement, it is alleged, implicated himself in the plot "to square things" up to such an extent that Captain Baker will confer with Immigration Inspector Frick for the purpose of having Martindale held for deportation until police can make further investigation of the case. The young man did his best to protect the elder brother and his brother's business partner, A. P. Richards, who brought the girl to Detroit. First he denied knowing anything about the case. Then, it is said, he admitted having played a part in the game of trying to hide the girl from her father, who came to the city to look for her, but denied having any knowledge of the real truth of the case.—Owen Sound Sun.
