MARTINDALE BOYS

FREE FROM BLAME.

An investigation following the suicide in Detroit of Anna Hailes, the Toronto girl who ran away with a man named A. D. Richards, shows that the Martindale boys, of Owen Sound, are entirely innocent of the affair in which they became involved. At first the police were inclined to lay part of the blame on the two young men, but they have proved that they were acting in the best interest of all concerned and were making an honest endeavor to have the girl return to her home in Toronto. Wm. Martindale is back at his home in Toronto attending to business, while Norman has been released by the Detroit police and is at present in Windsor. William, who is a partner of Richards in the real estate business, received a telegram from him asking for money a few days after he had skipped out with the girl. Mr. Martindale at once notified the girl's father, and they left for Detroit, accompanied by Norman Martindale. On arriving, the two young men went on the search and finally located the eloping pair. They induced Anna Hailes to consent to return, and agreed to return for her at a later hour. The unfortunate girl appeared to be very humiliated, and was averse to seeing her father. When they returned, they found her packing in preparation for the trip, but before they were there many minutes she disappeared and returned after having taken the fatal dose of carbolic acid. Richards was also there at the time, but he has disappeared and has not been seen since. The Martindale boys are entirely free from any blame in the matter, having done their best to bring Miss Hailes back to her home. This news will be very gratifying to the many friends of the young men in Owen Sound, where William and Norman are both highly respected. The boys' father, Mr. Gilbert Martindale, has returned from Toronto and when seen by The Sun said that his sons were feeling very keenly the position in which circumstances had placed them, but there is now no blame attached to their conduct.—O.S. Sun.

SETTLED OUT OF COURT.

A Guelph barber and dry goods clerk, the main members of the Palace Pool, Billiard and Bowling Club, arrived in Chesley last Thursday evening, to be ready for the trial before Magistrate Bell the following day at 10 a.m. Along with the members of this proprietary club, came their solicitor, Mr. Mowatt, of Guelph. But the case never came to trial. The Guelph lawyer soon saw that his clients were up against it and that the Municipal Act never contemplated any such evasion of the law. The bluff had been carried far enough and when Mr. Mickle, acting for the town, had consulted with the mayor, councillor Wright and the clerk, it was decided to accept an offer of \$150 license for four pool tables, with \$50 extra if bowling was allowed, provided the members of the proprietary club agreed to pay \$25 of the town's expenses incurred in the suit. This was mutually satisfactory, and a new by-law will be introduced at council meeting on Monday next, the license to date from March 1st. It is now up to Hanover and other towns where these proprietary clubs exist, to profit by Chesley's experience, and call the bluff.—Chesley Enterprise.

AFTER MORE RECORDS.

The Prize List of the Canadian National Exhibition, Toronto, August 24th to September 8th, has been issued. It shows the usual liberal prizes in all departments of live stock, agriculture and home work, amounting to a total of \$55,000. It is also evident that the list has been carefully revised to have it in keeping with up-to-date conditions.

A few of the innovations that might be noticed are provision for competition in breeding horses for strings of five horses; a number of sections added to provide for the newer breeds of poultry; \$100 in prizes for onions, tomatoes and celery in baskets. The last named is a government suggestion meant to encourage export of these commodities.

On the whole, the list shows a distinct advance on its predecessors, and, as the attractions will include a review of cadets from all the overseas dominions of the Empire, the Scots Guards Band and a brilliant historical spectacle, the siege of Delhi, it is safe to predict another record year for the Canadian National.

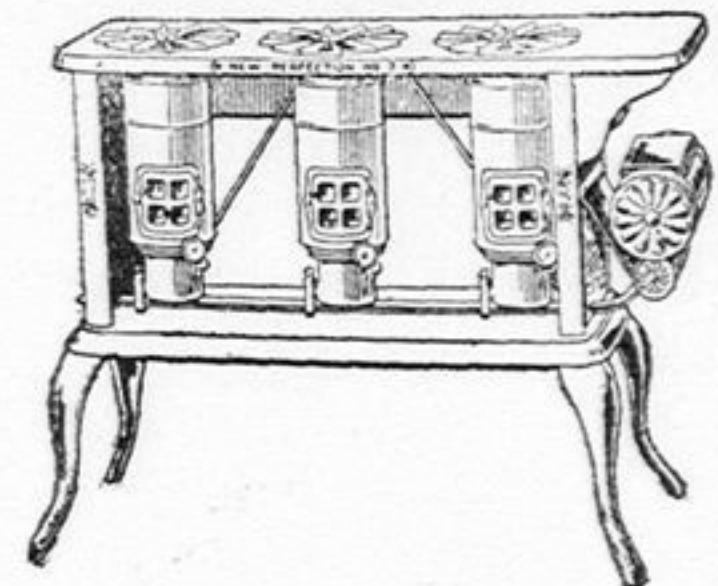
