

THE WORLD'S SIN THE CHURCH'S SIN

Opportunity for Eternal Life to Be Extended to All

Pastor Russell In Germany's Capital -Speaks Through an Interpreter-The Redemption Universal-Faith and Obedience and Loyalty the Qualifications - Rightly Dividing the Word of Truth.



Berlin, August 8.—Pastor Russell delivered two addresses here today. We report the one from the text, "He is the propitiation for our sins (the Church's sins), and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world." John ii, 2.) He declared against all limitations of

the Word of God not found in the Bible. He declares that the Devil of the Bible transforms himself into an angel of light in his endeavors to mislead the people of God and to make void the Word of God. The Bible nowhere represents the Devil with hoofs and horns and forked tail cavorting amidst flames of hell, torturing hapless beings and stoking fires. These misconceptions all belong to the creeds of the "dark | the more perhaps because Luke only

The Bible hell is sheol, hades-the tomb, the state of death, where both good and bad go and from which all are to be recovered in due time. The Church will be the first. "Blessed and holy are all they that have part in the First Resurrection; * * * they shall be priests unto God and unto Christ and shall reign with Him a thousand years (Revelation xx, 6). During that thousand years all the remainder of the race will have resurrection opportunities. Messiah's reign of a thousand years will be for this very purpose. The world's resurrection will not only include an awakening from the sleep of death, but much more. Anastasis, the Greek word for resurrection, means a raising up again-implying that the person was once up and fell down and is to be raised up again. The Apostle declares that man fell from perfection and the raising up again is to be to human perfection. None will be forced to return, but all the willing will be assisted to obedience, the reward of which will be a gradual uplifting to all that was lost in Eden and redeemed at Calvary. The unwilling, the disobedient, after full opportunity, he declares, will be destroyed in the Second Death, which the Scriptures symbolically represent as the Lake

of Fire.-Revelation xx, 14, 15. One Redemption-Two Salvations. Pastor Russell called attention to numerous Scriptures in harmony with his contention that the redemption provided in Jesus is to be co-extensive with the condemnation which come to all through Father Adam. Father Adam alone had been tried and, because of sin, had been sentenced to death. The remainder of humanity have never yet been individually tried. They have merely shared in hereditary weaknesses mental, moral and physical, and shared also in the hereditary death penalty which involved them in sin, sorrow and pain in conjunction with the ultimate result, death. It is because all were thus condemned through one man's disobedience that the death of the man Christ Jesus once for all can be justly the redemption-price for the sins of the world.

Christ has died. And the fact that but one class of humanity for whom that He was their own townsman, who he died has been blessed should be to us a guarantee that the remainder will be blessed, since "He tasted death for every man." The blessing during this age is confined by Divine limitation to those who can and do walk by faith and not by sight and who follow in the footsteps of Jesus, trusting Him as their Redeemer. These are the special class to whom God has promised a specially high salvation, a change of nature. St. Peter declares that the faithful shall be made partakers of the divine nature. (II. Peter i, 4.) St. John de, clares that these in the resurrection shall be like Jesus in His glorious state, far above angels. Jesus declares that they shall be with Him would consider!" "If thou hadst and sit upon His throne. They will be His Bride class, sharers of His Messianic work during that thousand years which God has set apart to be the world's Day of Judgment or time of trial-trial for life everlasting, or for death everlasting-extinction.

What the Text Teaches.

Our text declares the one redemp-

tion and the two applications-first to the Church and secondly to the world. He (Jesus) is a propitiation (satisfaction) for our sins, and not for ours only, but also for the sins of the whole world. Who is so blind as not to be able to see the difference between the Church and the world in this text? It reminds us, said Pastor Russell, of Jesus' words to His disciples, "Ye are not of this world, even as I am not of the world, for I have chosen you out of the world." Not only the Apostles were chosen out of the world and separated by their call and spirit-begetting and development in the School of Christ, but all of the followers of Jesus throughout this Gospel Age have been sharers in this same call to separateness from the world. They walk by faith and not by sight—their faithfulness in living unto the Lord and of Sidon and a leper from Syria, alnot for self, is promised the great reward of a share in the Messianic Kingdom glory, honor and immortality. Then when the Church shall have reached her glory will be the time for the world to be blessed. Lesson VIII.—Third Quarter, For Aug. 25, 1912.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES

Text of the Lesson, Luke iv, 16-30, Memory Verses, 18, 19-Golden Text, John i, 11 (R. V.)-Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

According to the narmonies of the

gospels, this lesson takes us back in the story a long distance, back to a time Cana and the meeting with the woman of Samaria, according to Matt. xiii, 54-58; Mark vi, 1-6. He did revisit Nazareth after the events in last week's lesson and taught in the synagogue, but could do mighty work, except healing a few sick folk, because of their unbelief. They were astonished at His wisdom, but they were offended at Him and said: "Whence hath this man all these things? Is not this the Carpenter, the Son of Mary, the brother of James and Joses and of Juda and Simon, and are not his sisters here with us?" He only replied, "A prophet is not without honor but in his own country and among his own life the following spring. kin and in his own house." Because He said something similar in our lesson for today some one must have thought the incidents the same, and records this, and only Matthew and Mark the other. The incident of this lesson occurred very early in His minwas probably His last visit to Nazareth. Turning to this lesson, we note that it was His custom to go to synagogue on the Sabbath day, and it could not have been for the benefit received from any discourse there, but there was always a portion read from the law, the prophets and the psalms, and that could not but be profitable to a truly devout mind Forsaking the assembling together is one of the common and increasing sins of our day, disobeying Heb. x. 25. There is a great forsaking of the house of God and despising of His word, but all things hasten to the consummation, and the kingdom shall be the Lord's. On this particular Sabbath He was

asked to read, and there was given Him

the roll or book of the prophet Isaiah. Finding the place known to us as chapter ixi, He read just a few sentences and closed the book or roll and gave it again to the minister and sat down. With what expression He must have read! It was surely according to Neh. viii, 8. He read distinctly and gave the sense, and now, having taken His seat, He was about to cause them to hear. He was about to cause them to understand the reading. We do not wonder the the eyes of all in the synagogue were fastened on Him (verse 20), for if this was His first reading it was the first time they had ever heard the Son of God read from His own book. How wonderful and startling were the words He uttered. "This day is this Scripture fulfilled in your ears!" (21.) For a literal fulfillment of each sentence that He read see Luke vii, 22; vii, 12; viii, 42; ix, 39; xiii, 16; John ix. It was so through all His ministry. Anointed with the Holy Ghost and with power, He went about doing good and healing all that were oppressed of the devil, for God was with Him (Acts x, 38). They could not but wonder at His gracious words, and yet they could not forget had been brought up in their midst, whom they had seen and known day by day for nearly thirty years. Had He not made and mended their plows and yokes many a time? What could He mean by His reference of that Scripture to Himself? Whom did He think Himself to be? Truly they knew Him not; but, oh, if they only had believed His word and inquired of Him more fully and meekly, how grand it might have been for them! What a heartache (as we would say) Israel always gave him, drawing from Him such words as: "Oh, that they were wise, that they understood, that they known!" "How often would I, * * * and ye would not!" "Israel would none of me" (Deut, xxxii, 29; Luke xix, 42; Matt. xxiii, 37; Ps. lxxxi, 11). How patient and long suffering He has been! But there is a limit, and so they have been scattered now these many centuries, and He has been keeping silence, bearing with His church and the nations and the devil, but there was a sentence in Isaiah which He did not read that day at Nazareth. He stopped just as He came to it and shut

the book. We are still living in the acceptable year of the Lord and still waiting for the day of vengeance of our God upon His enemies and the time to comfort all who mourn in Zion (Isa Ixi, 2, 3; lxiii, 4). See Ps. 1, 1-3; Isa. lxvi, 15, 16. They seem to have been offended not only at His saying, but also because He did not in their town some of the mighty works He had done at Capernaum. He reminded them that in the days of Elijah and Elisha it was not a widow or a leper in Israel who was in a special manner helped, but a widow though at that time there were many widows and lepers in Israel. It seems strange that when people of their own will cut themselves off from blessings they grow angry because they are not the carnal mind, which is enmity jeh and Bishe filled them with wrath, and they would have killed Him had He not slipped away from them.

GLENELG CENTRE FARMERS' CLUB HOLD MONTHLY MEET.

President Binnie called on Mr. John O'Neill to give a talk on the weed problem, as it affects the farmers. Before starting on his subject, Mr. O'-Neill spoke of the advantages of being able to speak in public, and urged more of the members to try their luck on the platform and help to qualify themselves before the Sermon on the Mount, to a for such positions as township time soon after the first miracle at councillor and member of parlia-

Of the weed problem. Mr. O'Neill spoke of the advantage of good cultivation, and urged all to get as many of the weed seeds growing as soon as possible after harvest. In this way, they had chance to get the young weeds checked before winter set in. If they can be checked twice in the fall, all the better, for the winter will give them a third check, and so weaken the plants that they will have a hard chance for their spoke of pure seed, and said that all buying seed should be sure they had the best, because they would save money in the weeds they would not have to fight by so doing. He mentioned the short rotation of crops as being istry, while that was much later and a good checking system for weeds. President Binnie mentioned two

or three of the worst weeds, and told of their habits, and how to kill them. He advised growing grass and clover seeds on the home place, and then all would know what weeds he had to fight and if the field were thoroughly clean there would be no weeds, and the farmer would be sure of it. Those weeds that take only one year to produce seeds, and are annuals, and those which are biennials and take two years to seed. can be eradicated by being sure that they do not go to seed, The perennials must be fought at both roots and seeds.
