**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH
WEST LAND REGULATIONS**

ANY PERSON who is the sole
head of a family, or any male
over 18 years old, may homestead
a quarter-section of available Dom-
inion land in Manitoba, Saskatch-
ewan or Alberta. The applicant
must appear in person at the Do-
minion Lands Agency, or Sub-agency
for the district. Entry by proxy
may be made at any agency, on
certain conditions by father, moth-
er, son, daughter, brother or sister
of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence
upon and cultivation of the land
in each of three years. A home-
steader may live within nine miles
of his homestead on a farm of at
least 80 acres solely owned and oc-
cupied by him or by his father,
mother, son, daughter, brother or
sister.

In certain districts a homestead-
er in good standing may pre-empt
a quarter section alongside his
homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties.—Must reside upon the
homestead or pre-emption six
months in each of six years from
date of homestead entry (includ-
ing the time required to earn
homestead patent) and cultivate
fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhaust-
ed his homestead right and cannot
obtain a pre-emption may enter
for a purchased homestead in
certain districts. Price \$3.00 per
acre. Duties.—Must reside six
