Duncan Campbell, one of Hanover's oldest and best citizens and one of the most widely known figures in Grey county, passed across on the evening of Labor Day, at the age of 83 years. He was one of the landmarks of Hanover, and by his death one of the few remaining links binding Busy Hanover of to-day, with the little "corner store grocery" days has been severed. The late Mr. Campbell was one of the most interesting, picturesque and delightful personages the town has ever had. His nature was all sunshine, and even in the closing years of his life, when nature demanded her own and the infirmities of four score years could not be withstood his heart remained young, and the spontaneity and buoyancy of youth could not be repressed. > Duncan Campbell was born in Kintyre, Argyleshire, Scotland, 83 years ago next December, and is a son of the late Peter Campbell. He emigrated when 16 years of age, his first position being that of a school teacher at Hespeler, then known as New Hope. In 1854, he went to Durham, and three years later came to Hanover, where he had lived ever since with the exception of two years spent in Manitoba. This was his occupation from 1857 to 1870, when he started a foundry, running it for fifteen years. In 1880 he was appointed inspector of weights and measures, holding same for two years. He was always a force at the council board.
