of corn stalks, alfalfa, clover, timothy and orchard grass. Mr. Binnie had some fine specimens of wild seeds, and a very attractive collection of insects, bugs, butterflies, etc. Mr. Firth's display consisted of a number of different kinds of birds, mounted by himself who for a number of years took a great interest in taxidermy.

Mr. W. J. McFadden had a corner, in which he had a display of pianos and organs.

Mr. C. P. Kinnee was a busy man, showing magnificent workmanship in harness that was made by himself.

Considerable interest was taken by visitors at the fair over two Magnet gasoline engines exhibited in operation by Robt. Ewen, local agent here. A two horse-power two-cycle engine turning a cream separator, was much admired by the farmers and farmers' wives, many of whom will be inclined shortly to save labor by installing one of these little machines. A six horse-power four-cycle engine was also in operation and ran beautifully during the afternoon. This engine was sold to Mr. John Adlam, of Mulock, and will be used for general work on the farm. Both engines were manufactured by the Petrie Manufacturing Co., of Hamilton. The workmanship is good, to all appearances, and they are so simple to operate that no one need fear to make a purchase and get good results. The Company's representative, Mr. R. McMillan, of Listowel, was present during the day to explain the machines to enquiring visitors.

Mr. H. W. Hunt had a nice exhibit that must have brought pleasant dreams to the women on the farm. It was a small gasoline engine manufactured by the Gilson people, of Guelph. Attached to this was a washing machine and a churn, all in operation, just as similar farm implements are seen in operation at the larger exhibitions. Mr. Hunt is agent here for the Gilson engines, and no doubt his exhibit, assisted by explanations from a factory expert, will help to make sales in this locality. The engine is a small horizontal, hopper cooled, gasoline in base, suction feed, jump spark, and mounted on trucks so as to be easily hauled by hand from one place to another. It is quite simple, was working well, and had many admirers.

A successful concert was given on each evening of the fair. The entertainers were Miss Florence McNeill, vocalist; Miss Pearl O'Neill, elocutionist; Mr. Eddie Pigott, comedian, and Miss Annie McKay piano accompanist. All did their parts well, and many of the pleased audience will be glad to hear them again. The total proceeds amounted to about one hundred and seventy dollars.
