

PASTOR RUSSELL AT ILLINOIS STATE FAIR

Honor to the Son Means Honor to the Father Also.

The Work of Calvary Progressing, but Far From Finished-The Selection of the Elect Church Is the Beginning, Net the Completion, of the Divine Purpose.



Springfield, Ill., Oct. 6.-Pastor Russell arrived yesterday, the guest of the State Board. In his evening address the text was taken from Philippians ii, 10, 11: "At the name of Jesus every knee shall bow and every tongue confess."

Pastor drew attention to the fact that for half a century the world has been undergoing a most marvelous revolution along the lines of increase of knowledge. He referred briefly to the share of Illinois in this onward march of

intelligence. This, he said, is plainly manifest at this Fair in the wonderful display of labor-saving devices, etc. He remarked on the school exhibitions and what they indicate of the progress of general knowledge even amongst the young. He remarked also on the improved breeds of live stock, poultry, etc. This progress belongs to the last fifty years. The fruits and vegetables also, he declared, remind one of Paradise and lead us to wonder if there could have been more nearly perfect fruit and vegetables

Glorious Epoch Beginning.

Our blessings are the foregleams of coming blessings, which, undoubtedly, will be manyfold greater.
