STEAL FIRE ARMS FROM STORE WINDOW.

A daring thief made a \$75 haul from the north show window of Creeper & Griffin's hardware store on Sunday night. The goods taken consisted mostly of firearms, a display of which was in the window. A small piece of plate glass of triangular shape was removed by the burglar from the lower corner of one of the panes in the front of the window and with the use of a strip of galvanized iron about 18 inches long, which had a turn on the end, the burglar managed to remove a quantity of the goods on display. There had been a short crack in the corner of the glass for some time, but the burglar evidently worked for some time before completing the crack and wrenching the section of glass out of place. Marks of a hammer are seen on the piece of glass removed and it is evident that the man encountered great difficulty in getting out the glass. With this out the opening was sufficient for him to put in his hand and use the strip of galvanized iron with which he secured hold on the guns and other goods in the window and pulled them out. The goods missed out of the window are three guns, three revolvers, four hunting knives, two compasses, several small arms and a quantity of ammunition. The piece of glass removed, together with the strip of galvanized iron used, were found on the sidewalk on Monday morning. The burglary had been planned ahead of time, for the strip of iron was evidently made up for the job and had been folded up in a size convenient for a pocket. Chief McAuley has the case in hand and it is hoped that the slick gentleman will be caught. —Owen Sound Sun.

ESCAPE DEATH FROM POISONING.

Little Dorothy Brown, the two-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Percy Brown, 5th Ave. E., barely escaped death from poisoning, the result of eating toad-stools, on Saturday afternoon. The little girl was playing in the yard at the side of the house. A few toad-stools were growing there and the child apparently thinking they were candies picked them up and ate them. During the afternoon she became ill and went into a sleep from which she could not be roused. Dr. Hershey was called and found the child suffering from poisoning and it was only by prompt measures that her life was saved. All day Sunday her condition was critical, but Monday she appeared to be on a fair way to recovery. —Owen Sound Sun.

MOUNT FOREST IMPORTANT REPRESENTATIVE CONVENTION.

The Annual District Epworth League Convention will meet at Grand Valley on October 29, 30, 31. An excellent strong programme has been prepared. The Bible Study will be in charge of Dr. Irwin, of Mt. Forest, and Professor McLaughlin, of Victoria College, Toronto. The Mission Study classes will be conducted by Miss M. J. Hockey, B.A., Toronto; Miss Clara E. German, B.A., London; Rev. W. W. Prudham, B.A., B.D., Durham. All of these leaders are from the staffs of summer schools of the church. The work of the different League committees will be in charge of F. L. Farewell, B.A., Associate Secretary of the Epworth League work of the Methodist church. In addition to this, special features will be introduced, such as "Model Mission Study Class," by Mount Forest League; "Mock Trial," Grand Valley League; "Country Commission," Monticello Young People; "Conference on Rural Work," Rev. F. L. Farewell. The Convention will conclude by a Moving Picture Lecture by Dr. Wallace Crawford, of Canadian Methodist Missions on China and Japan. These pictures were secured at a cost of \$4,000 by the Methodist Mission Board and are being shown now for the first time. All sessions are public. Any one who desires instruction along the lines of the Convention's work will be cordially welcomed.—Grand Valley Star and Vidette.

LAURIER'S ONTARIO TOUR.

Among the numerous errors of judgment which mark the Laurier tour through Ontario, the Peterborough incident shines as a peculiarly bright example. The Liberal leader in his speech at Peterborough attempted to call Lord Milner, of all men, as a witness in behalf of the Laurier navy. The attempt was ill-considered, Lord Milner being then in Canada. It so happens that Lord Milner stands in a group of British statesmen who are pre-eminent as empire builders, in whose scheme of things the Laurier navy would and could have no place. Yet Sir Wilfrid Laurier boldly proclaimed on the platform at Peterborough that Lord Milner approved of a Canadian navy as the best way by which Canada could help the mother country. Lord Milner was made aware of the use to which his name had been put at Peterborough. His reply was that in his speech in Toronto four years ago—to which, he thought, Sir Wilfrid Laurier had alluded—he had advocated a Canadian navy, "but specially emphasized that it should be for Imperial, not merely for Canadian purposes." Everybody knows that the Laurier navy had no place in any such purpose as this outlined by Lord Milner. As to what he had since said on landing at Halifax, Lord

Miner added, "The British people will welcome anything Canada may decide to do and approve the spirit in which she has taken the matter up. Personally I favor Canada and the self-governing dominions creating their own navies, though this would be of little use if, when established, they did not act as one. Meanwhile, as it will take time to build up a Canadian navy, a direct contribution to the British navy may be desirable, preferably of ships, not money. But any share the dominions take in Imperial defence should involve a share in the control of policy. They are not tributary states but partners in the Empire."

LONG AND FAITHFUL SERVICE.

The following recently appeared in the Toronto Star: It is rumored that Dr. Sproule, M.P., Speaker of the House of Commons, will soon be appointed to the Senate, and that after the redistribution Grey County will have but two members. While we think the Senate should be abolished, yet, if it is to be retained as a place of reward for faithful party men, nobody can very well dispute Dr. Sproule's claim on the Conservative party, as he is about the oldest member of the Commons, and was always a diligent member. He has devoted his life to politics rather than to the practice of his profession. Before the general elections last year, Mr. R. L. Borden and some of his lieutenants were in a constituency near Grey County, and sought to know why a clever young doctor had refused the Conservative nomination. "Well," he said, "most of my life is ahead of me, and I have decided not to become a Landerkin or a Sproule." He explained that what he meant was that Dr. Sproule and the late Dr. Landerkin were on opposite sides in politics and sat for adjoining con-
