The Turko-Balkan War is over, so far as Turkey's chances of winning are concerned. Next comes the division of the spoils. Russia, Austria, France and Italy appear to be looking for some of the pickings, and according to the war despatches, the Balkan States themselves are not very unanimous as to what they want. "To the victor belongs the spoils" is one of the old adages, and it is to be hoped that the Balkan States will be allowed to settle the division of the captured territory as they deem best.

The Liberal press has gone to considerable trouble since the East Middlesex election in accounting for the defeat of the Liberal standard-bearer. Rowell's "Abolish the Bar" platform was to carry their man in with such a landslide that the jolt hurt when it was found that the Whitney candidate had been elected with a 500 majority. From the vote polled, it would appear that the temperance people of East Middlesex are more satisfied with the administration of Mr. Whitney and his colleagues than they were with the various Liberal governments who previously held office, and who surely had ample opportunity in their thirty-two years of administration to show what they could do. A burnt child fears the fire, and Mr. Rowell's "abolish the bar" platform undoubtedly appears to the temperance forces as just another fairy tale, of which the former Liberal governments had such a good supply.

The phonograph is known to everybody, and is now so common that people have ceased to think of it as one of the most wonderful productions of the last twenty-five or thirty years. Its use for purposes of entertainment is still common, but as a business utility it is coming more and more into use. A short time ago, we heard of its use as a business record-keeper. When the conversation began, an operator in an adjoining room set the machine in motion, and every sound uttered was transmitted to the record and preserved for future reference if necessity demanded. In business offices, too, letters may be dictated into the records and subsequently reproduced in writing at the convenience of the typewriter. It is not only a novelty, but is fast becoming a business necessity. Who can fail to admire the genius of such men as Thomas A. Edison, whose life and energies have been spent for the welfare of the world.

Toronto's ministerial fraternity have, for the past couple of months, been conducting a campaign of censure against the class of amusements put on at local theatres, especially the burlesque and vaudeville houses. The council met October 12th, as per adjournment, all the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: From Dr. Hutton, account for attending a Board of Health meeting in Toronto; from Lucas, Raney and Henry, re Haw vs Glenelg; from J. A. Horning, claim for E. W. Bull; from Douglas Davidson, stating that a charge of \$1 per day would be made against Glenelg for the maintenance of Ernest McRae, admitted to the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto—after considering Mr. Davidson's communication in committee the clerk was instructed to inform Mr. Davidson that the council would resist such claim.

Road commissioners reported expenditures in their respective wards as follows: Ward 2, \$27.93; ward 3, \$142.53; and ward 4, \$110.85. On motion, orders for payment of same were issued.

Lindsay-Nichol—That Dr. Hutton be paid \$16.50, half cost of attending Board of Health meeting in Toronto.—Carried.

McMillan-Lindsay—That Andrew Lindsay be paid \$4.50, and Wm. Weir \$3 for work at bridge, at lot 56, concession 3, E.G.R.—Carried.

McMillan-Lindsay—That payments be made as follows, for putting in culvert at the Hall: Paul Nelson, \$3; Jas. Nelson, \$2; Wm. Ryan, \$1.50; James McArthur, \$1.50; Archie McDonald, \$1.50; John Gray \$1.50; J. McMillan, \$1.50. Wm. Weir, \$1.50. Total, \$14.—Carried.

Nichol-Young—That the selectors of jurors be paid \$3 each.—Carried.

Nichol-Young—That the following amounts be paid for gravel: Martin Stonehouse, \$1.65; M. Norris, \$1.65; S. Wright, \$1.—Carried.

Lindsay-McMillan—That Mr. Nichol be appointed to meet the reeve of Holland re accident to E. W. Bull.—Carried.

McMillan-Young—That the account of Sawyer & Massey, amounting to \$21 for grader repairs be paid.—Carried.

Nichol-Young—That the treasurer be paid \$3.95 for postage and stationery supplies.—Carried.

Young-Lindsay—That the reeve Mr. Nichol and Mr. McMillan be a committee to repair Murchison's bridge.—Carried.

Nichol-Lindsay—That the following amounts be paid as commission for special works: J. A. McMillan \$4, Wm. Weir \$1, Joseph Young \$11.28, T. Nichol \$11.40.—Carried.

Nichol-Young—That this council pay the sum of \$50 into court re Haw's case for damages, and the council issue cheque for the same.—Carried.

Nichol-Young—That the treasurer receive a refund of \$4 from Jas. Ellison, the Government having paid for polling place for election December 11th, 1911.—Carried.

Lindsay-McMillan—That George Ryan be paid \$6.70, being two-thirds value of sheep killed by dogs.—Carried.

Commissions on appropriations were paid as follows: J. Young \$9, R. Lindsay \$6; T. Nichol \$10.85, and J. A. McMillan \$5. The clerk was paid \$3.95 for postage.

The council adjourned to November 16th, at 10 a.m. J. A. BLACK, Clerk.

WOODROW WILSON'S MOTHER.

That the mother of the President elect of the United States was once a resident of the county of Leeds and Grenville, Ontario, and lived in the county town of Brockville, is not known to everybody, but it is a fact, nevertheless.

Mrs. Wilson's father was the Rev. Dr. Thomas Woodrow, a Scotch Presbyterian, who crossed the Tweed and spent sixteen years as a pastor in Carlisle, England. Feeling a strong call to do missionary work in Canada, he left the old land in 1836, with his large family of eight children, and crossed the Atlantic, arriving in New York just in time to part with his helpful helpmeet.

Immediately after the funeral of his wife, Mr. Woodrow and his motherless children pushed on to Brockville, which he made his headquarters while he engaged in a vigorous visitation of the surrounding district as a home missionary.

Among the children was a girl named Janet, more generally known as "Jessie," who was about twelve years of age at the time, and who played and studied in the old town by the northern bank of the St. Lawrence. After a little more than a year's service in Canada, Mr. Woodrow received a call to Chillicothe, Ohio, and recrossed the American border.

While attending a young ladies' academy near the Ohio home about eight years later Jessie Woodrow first met her future husband, a young Presbyterian minister, Joseph Ruggles Wilson, and two years afterward they were married.
