THE POULTRY SHOW

The Durham and South Grey Poultry and Pet Stock Show on Wednesday and Thursday of last week, was a great success, both in the number and class of exhibits. This was the third annual show of the society, and every year so far, it has been growing better. Two years ago, there were about three hundred entries, last year the number reached about five hundred, and this year they made another jump up and reached five hundred and fifty. Outside exhibits came here from Hanover, Bolton, Listowel, and other places, yet, notwithstanding the competition, our local fanciers were able to capture a good share of the prizes. Poultry raising in Durham and vicinity has become a profitable and we think it should receive every encouragement. Many of the factory hands have engaged in the business, and they find it not only profitable, but a healthful recreation. They take much interest in spending their leisure hours amongst their feathered favorites.
