**THE PROPER WAY TO DUST.**

Everything has to be learned— even the simple art of dusting. The proper way to dust is to have a duster in each hand, which method is quite necessary to suc-

cess, for the duster in the left hand is needed to prevent finger marks when steadyng and lifting highly polished furniture.

Each piece of furniture should

be wiped lightly from the top

downward to remove the dust, and

then, after the duster has been

shaken out of the window—never

over the carpet—the wood should

be smartly rubbed to bring up a

polish. Be sure you treat a

stuffed cushion with a brush and

duster before dealing with the

wood, otherwise the dust from the

upholstered cushion will fly out

on to the wood of the chairs or

sofas.
