A REAL WAR AT ORANGEVILLE

THE PROPER WAY TO DUST.

Everything has to be learned— even the simple art of dusting. The proper way to dust is to have a duster in each hand, which method is quite necessary to success, for the duster in the left hand is needed to prevent finger marks when steadying and lifting highly polished furniture.

Each piece of furniture should be wiped lightly from the top downward to remove the dust, and then, after the duster has been shaken out of the window—never over the carpet—the wood should be smartly rubbed to bring up a polish. Be sure you treat a stuffed cushion with a brush and duster before dealing with the wood, otherwise the dust from the upholstered cushion will fly out on to the wood of the chairs or sofas.

Carried.—McLeod-That the reeve issue his order on the treasurer for \$12.60, being for premium of reinsurance on hall.—Carried.

Caswell-Brown-That T. A. Gilchrist be paid \$5.30 for account of repairs to grader.—Carried.

Brown-McLeod-That the account of W. H. Thurston of \$14.07 for supplies purchased from the Municipal World be paid.—Carried.

Graham-Caswell-That the reeve issue his order on the treasurer for \$7 in favor of the treasurer of Osprey, the amount being the sums paid by subscription to the Osprey municipal telephone system.—Carried.

Brown-Caswell-That the account of \$5 for six subscriptions to the Municipal World be paid.—Carried.

McLeod-Graham-That this council having examined the treasurer's security find the same to consist of a bond issued by the London Guarantee Co. for the sum of \$2000, and we deem the security sufficient.—Carried.

McLeod-Graham-That Archie McArthur, lot 8, con. 1, N.D.R., be refunded \$1 for dog charged in error in his taxes of 1912.—Carried.

McLeod-Brown-That Mr. McKenzie and Mr. Bellamy be a committee to meet with the committee from Proton, also committee from Ephrasia, to settle amounts expended on town lines.—Carried.

Caswell-McLeod-That this council accept the tender of Alexander Hill of Owen Sound, to supply and erect a steel bridge over the Saugenee river at lot 7, con. 1, N.D.R., for the sum of \$500.—Carried.

Caswell-Brown-That this council hold its next meeting at Priceville.—Carried.

The following should have appeared in the minutes of the last session of the council.

Brown-McLeod-That \$1,300 is hereby appropriated to be expended on the highways of this township as follows: In Division No. 1, \$300; No. 2, \$300; No. 3, \$320; No. 4, \$300; the Valley Road from Locks Mill to the town line to Ephrasia, \$100. This amount to include all work on town lines and over and above any new work in the township, and shall also include expenditure on bridges costing not more than \$25 each, the reeve and commissioner of the division in which a bridge is required to be built shall be a committee to oversee the building and repairs to bridges costing over \$5 in any division, and no special expenditure shall be made without a resolution of this council.

The commissioners of this council shall be paid salaries, viz., Div. No. 1, A.D. McLeod; No. 2, J. J. Graham; No. 3, W. J. Caswell; No. 4, F. Brown; the Valley Road, the reeve, and each shall report in writing to council before any commission is paid.—Carried.
