### A RAILWAY PROBLEM.

A large railway system suffers loss of more than 18 tons of metal daily, due solely to the effect of rust. Thus far, the only known preventive is to keep the metal surface always covered with a suitable paint. Some idea of the costliness of this remedy, however, may be gained from the fact that it requires about \$9,000 annually to paint one large railway bridge alone. A typical case of this kind is the Brooklyn bridge, upon which a corps of painters is constantly employed, as the weather makes repainting of one section before the workers have reached the other. Although experience has demonstrated that pure iron surrounded by oxygen does not rust, and that some acid, especially carbonic acid, is necessary for the production of rust, the secret of manufacturing rustless steel and iron remains to be discovered.
