MAKING & BELT.

Bell making is one of the few arts which have been in practice from the earliest times, but even to this "Out of a damp shadow in a lane | day it has never reached a state of there darts a haggard youth, pale as a perfection. Very skilled workmen are needed to construct bells so that they shall be melodious, artistic and dur-

The bell of to-day is Lsually composed of five parts of tin to sixteen parts of copper. It has been found by the large bell founders that to put too much tin in a bell often causes undesirable results, of which been obtained by using " old copper and procuring good tin.

In constructing a large bell the first step is to make the mold. This is really the most vital stage in the whole process, for the slightest error at this point would certainly lead to failure, and the work would all have to be done over again.

After the bell is cast it is sent to the tuning shop, where metal is pared off from the inside according to need. Before the tuning of bells had been studied as an art it was pointed out dramatis personae and that without that a large bell was hardly ever in him in the act of giving aims the tune. A bell to be in proper tune must first be in tune with itself-this is to say, it should have at least five tones at correct intervals from one another in order to produce a perfect

musical chord. These harmonies are the hum note, fundamental and nominal, and also the third and fifth from the fundamental, or in other words the strike note. If we were to put the first three named in musical notation with a bell we should get three Cs in octaves.

It was always found, very much to the surprise of the maker, that smaller bells were in worse tune than the larger ones, but after the mastery of the harmonics it was found that practically all these difficulties disappeared, enabling more perfect bells to be produced.

No Orphans In Australia.

There are no orphans in Australia. That is not because parents never die there, but because, when they do, the state at once steps in to the rescue their little ones. Children who have been robbed by death of their natural protectors are practically adopted by the Government.

Unless some near relative manifests a desire to assume the responsibility and can demonstrate his ability to do so, the child is committed to the Children's Council, which selects some home among the farmers of the country. These foster homes are examined closely and often two or three are tried before one is found in which the child finds congenial surround-

After thirteen the state feels that its ward should earn more than board and lodgings. At that age, therefore, he is hired out, usually, however, to the foster parents who have been previously taking care of him. Threefourths of his wages are deposited in savings banks; the remainder is his. When he becomes of age, or if he wishes money in order to learn a trade or to attend a more advanced school -or, in the case of a gril, when she wishes to marry - the savings are turned over to the ward.
