THE INDUSTRIOUS MOLE. A naturalist once conceived the notion of ascertaining the amount of work a mole could accomplish in a given time. Accordingly the experimenter turned a large specimen loose in the middle of a five-acre field. Five seconds, it is averred, after this mole received its freedom, it had burrowed out of sight and the observer, with his assistants, after driving a stake at the starting point, retired and left the little digger hard at work. The start was made at 11 o'clock in the morning, and the direction taken was to the east. By 6 o'clock in the evening this mole is said to have dug some 23 feet in an irregular course, keeping, however, in the same general direction, and not attempting any side galleries. Twenty-four hours after the start the tunnel had been driven 31 feet further with a number of side galleries, and four feet had been added to the extremity, making 68 feet of the main line and 36 feet of branches, or a total of 104 feet of tunnels dug in 24 hours.

The bottom of the tunnels ran very evenly, about four inches below the surface. At certain points the hole was elliptical in shape, measuring one and one-half inches in width by two inches in height, and sometimes it was triangular, measuring two inches each way. The surface of the ground was usually cracked and raised about an inch along the course of the tunnel.

A BIG SEIZURE OF BOOZE. On Friday evening of last week, license inspector, Matt. C. Beckett made a big seizure of gin down at the C.P.R. station shortly before six o'clock. There were in all 246 bottles and they were packed neatly and cutely away in four barrels of the variety in which sugar is generally shipped. The address on the barrels was that of the well-known firm of Taylor & Pringle, the pickle manufacturers and they, of course, were in no wise cognizant of the use that was being made of their name or that the stuff was coming. Evidently the slick evaders of the law were using the name of the firm for the purpose of diverting suspicion from the real contents of the barrels. The barrels were just being transferred from the car in which they had come to the shed when the inspector swooped down on them and claimed them as his. Investigation of the contents proved that he had either had information or made a shrewd deduction, for the contents proved to be London gin of the kind called dry. The find was conveyed to the police station by a transfer rig and there locked up to await the action of the magistrate in the proceedings of confiscation which the inspector instituted. There is no trace yet of who the person or persons may be who ordered the booze or were expecting to receive it. It is a cinch though that it is a body blow at some of the organized efforts which have been carried on quietly during evading the liquor law.—Ower Sound Times.

SEVEN DEACONS ADVANCED TO PRIESTHOOD. His Lordship, the Bishop of Huron, held a special ordination service in Windsor Sunday morning, when seven deacons were advanced to the order of the priesthood. All Saints' church, of which the Rev. Arthur Carlisle, B.A., formerly of London, is rector, was crowded to capacity at all services, there being a large attendance of clergy from neighboring places, as well as laymen from the city and elsewhere. The candidates were examined in London by the bishop's chaplains, Revs. Canon Sage, D.D., of St. George's church, and R.S.W. Howard, M.A., of Chatham. They were presented to his lordship at the ordination by the Ven. W. A. Young, D.D., archdeacon of Norfolk and registrar of the diocese. The sermon was preached by the Rev. C. E. Jenkins, M.A., B.D., rector of Clinton. It was very earnest and scholarly and left a marked impression on the minds of candidates and congregation. PARENTAL RESPONSIBILITY. Recently, at Orangeville, a case was tried before Chancellor Sir John A. Boyd, which is of some interest to parents throughout the country, says the Shelburne Economist. A little lad of nine had been kicked by a boy of twelve, and as a result of the kick suffered such injury that an operation became necessary. The father of the injured child then sued the father of the older boy for damages. The defendant claimed that the injury was simply an accident, but the plaintiff declared that the older boy had vicious propensities, and that his father knew it. The boys, their parents and the doctors all gave evidence, and the case went to the jury, who awarded the plaintiff \$200 damages. According to the decision, the father of a child is liable for damages for the wrong committed by that child, without either his knowledge or sanction, i.e., the parent is responsible, not only morally, but legally, for his child. It may be that he ought to control him, and if he fails to do so, he is responsible to society for the results which may follow. This may seem to be a hardship at times, but if the parent is not responsible for his child, who is?
