HOW LONG TO COOK

It is impossible to give a definite table of the correct time for cooking various summer vegetables. However, each housewife can refer to the approximate table given and correct it as experience suggests that it should be corrected.

Corn should be cooked 10 minutes in water which is boiling actively when the corn is put in.

Asparagus should be cooked about half an hour.

Potatoes should be covered with boiling water and boiled about 20 minutes.

Beets need about an hour. So do turnips and squash.

Peas become tender in about half an hour. They can be cooked in a double boiler, after the French fashion, for about two hours, without water but with a lettuce leaf to moisten them—a method which brings out a delicate flavor.

String beans should be cooked about two hours, slowly, until they are perfectly tender. Spinach will be tender after boiling an hour.
