NEW MUSKOKA TRAIN.

THE GREY AND BRUCE PRESS ASSOCIATION MEET AT HARRISTON.

The Grey and Bruce Press Association held its annual meeting in the Public Library auditorium in Harriston on Saturday. There was a very large attendance. Some important questions were considered and debated thoroughly, a few of which were the adoption of an advertising rate card, the action that the association should take toward the wholesale house which deals direct with the consumer, the attitude of the local press toward the municipality which goes out of its locality for printing, the extension of the association to embrace the counties of Dufferin, Wellington and Huron and the question of the differences in price paid by the different offices for ready print. The last came in for considerable discussion, and it was discovered that there was a very wide difference in prices, ranging from a free supply to 16 cents per quire, and the following committee was appointed to investigate the matter: J. J. Hunter, Kincardine; T. Nash, Wroxeter and W. Durham, who are to con-
