Wakefield Gra fatal bolt was drawn. This, however, he has not done. In a message, in his own hand writing, and read on the scaffold by his spiritual adviser, Rev. While we respect the opinions of those who are opposed to capital punishment, we feel that the Department of Justice at Ottawa did the correct thing in allowing the law to take its course, and not listening to the appeals of sentimentalists, who are only too easily found on all such occasions. The evidence, it is true, was all circumstantial. Nobody saw the crime committed, but sufficient was brought out to form a strong link connecting the crime with the poor unfortunate who paid


