IN SEVEN DAYS**

Lesson X.—Second Quarter. For
June 8, 1913.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Gen. xiv, 1-15;
Memory Verses, 4, 5—Golden Text,
Ps. cxxiii, 1—Commentary Prepared
by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

There is no mistake about it—the

world is growing smaller. Magellan,
its first circumnavigator, took no
fewer than three years over the task.In 1907 Lieutenant-Colonel H. Burnley-
Campbell, a veteran of sixty-four,

raced round it in a little over forty

days. This is the record, so far; but

it will probably be broken in the not

far distant future.

The waterplane, of course, is des-

igned to accomplish this seeming im-

possibility. It can be done, airmen
have no doubt. It is merely a matter

of building machines big enough

and with sufficiently powerful engines and

adequate storage capacity.

First will come the flight across the

Atlantic—roughly speaking, two thou-

sand miles from land to land.

Then will follow preparations for

the greater journey—the crowning

achievement of all—the flight

round the globe.

This is not so difficult as it sounds.

Possibly the flight across the Atlantic

from, say, St. John's, Newfoundland,

to Valenta, on the southwest coast

of Ireland will be a more trying or-

deal to airmen than any single stage

in the round-the-world flight. And for

this reason. The North Atlantic is

proverbially a rough and stormy

ocean, even in summer.

The aeronaut who essays to fly

round the world, on the other hand,

can choose his own route; and this

means that he can fly, for the most

part, over tropical seas, and in air

of an equable temperature.

Nor need he at any time make a

longer land-to-land journey than that

which will have to be accomplished

by the winner of the trans-Atlantic

flight. His jumping-off place, so to

speak, will probably be Cape San

Roque, in Brazil, whence he will set

out on his flight to Africa, and then

through the Straits of Gibral-

tar, and, by way of the Mediterranean,

the Red and the Arabian Seas to

Ceylon.

Thence past the "Spice Islands," ad-

the old navigators christened them, he

will fly, by way of Torres Strait, out

into the Coral Sea and the broad, isle-

studded Pacific, and so back by way

of Panama to his starting-place.

Approximately, the distance trav-

eled by the route indicated will be

about 30,000 miles, and this can be

covered, by a waterplane of 200 horse-

power, at the rate of one hundred

miles an hour, making 300 hours of

actual flight.

Assuming the pilot to fly on an
