BENTINCK COUNCIL.

Council met at Lamiasl on May 26. Reeve and councillors Brown, Fischer and Shewell were present.

Mr. Metcalfe being absent, the council extended to him and his family their sincere sympathy.

Shewell-Fischer-That the assessment of T. Daniels, lot 2 of 7, be reduced \$150.-Carried.

Fischer-Brown-That assessment of Robt. Grierson be confirmed.-Carried.

Brown-Shewell-That appeals requesting the following transfer of lots be granted: Ed. McLaughlan to S. McCracken, A. S. Hunter to A. Morton, W. Hopkins to Thos. Hopkins, G. Campbell to Jas. McDonald, H. Schink to G. McGeagh, G. Harvie to W. Ives, G. Henderson to J. Maxwell.

Shewell-Brown-That appeal of J. Noble, J. Russell, G. Schmidt and J. Whiteman asking to have dogs cancelled on roll be granted.-Carried.

Shewell-Fischer-That the following names be added to the roll: F. Nichol, W. Pust, R. Hodder, J. Lahn, G. Mighton, T. Davies and W. Eidt.-Carried.

Total assessment, \$1,311,475.00; total population, 2,610.

The list of appeals being heard and decided, the Court of Revision was declared closed.

After the adjournment of the Court of Revision, Council met for transaction of general business. Minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed.

Fischer-Shewell-That H. Cross be paid \$50 for bridge, lot 11, con. 14.-Carried.

Brown-Fischer-That Elmwood receive amount of money due for statute labor and \$50 of a grant.-Carried.

Fischer-Brown-That Reeve and Geo. Brown be a committee to consult owners of lot 43 to 47 with a view of making a deviation around hill. They have power to purchase land and if no agreement can be made they have power to arbitrate.-Carried.

Brown-Shewell-That on account of statute labor being paid in taxes of J. Ferguson, C. Shewell, R. Wade, W. Dobney, Mrs. Elizabeth and D. Eidt, we recommend same to be expended in their respective divisions.-Carried.

KNOW ABOUT US

Newmarket carried a by-law to expend \$5,000 in order to obtain the grant for the Carnegie Library. The majority was 75.

Wm Baird, an Englishman born in 1830, died in Orangeville jail, where he had been admitted as an indigent 27 years ago.

C. P. R. employees of the Eastern Division, about 10,000 in all, have received an increase in wages of 10 per cent, beginning June 2.

John A. Lamprey, who was mayor and alderman of Guelph for many years, died recently. He was the son of an English army officer and was born on the ocean 82 years ago.

Melvin Moyer, an alderman of St. Catharines, had his leg amputated for gangrene. He fell on the sidewalk a year ago and injured his knee, on which an operation was performed a couple of weeks ago.

Mrs. Rev. John Wells died on Friday last at the home of her son, Sidney, and interment took place Monday at Nairn, near Ailsa Craig. Mr. Wells was pastor of the Flesherston Presbyterian church about 20 years ago.

To avoid the danger of level crossings over the Grand Trunk and Canadian Pacific tracks near Toronto Junction stockyards, the Canadian Northern Railway Co. have proposed a tunnel 2,360 feet in length, and to cost half a million dollars.

Mr. J. P. Brown, M.P., died at St. Luke's hospital. He was known as "the silent man" of the House. He was member for Chateaugay almost continuously since 1891 and his maiden speech of twenty minutes' duration was made during the obstruction of the naval debate.

He was a Liberal, 72 years of age, and had been ailing some time from stomach trouble.

A number of the pay station phone boxes have been robbed in Toronto. The thief is supposed to be an old telephone man, acquainted with the mechanism. From the six pay booths in Eaton's store he got away with about \$175.

His plan is to call up central and ask the operator to give him a ring. Thinking him an employee of the company, the operator responds, and while the ring is coming in the bottom of the box is pried off with a thin chisel and the money taken. Several boxes in drug stores and hotels have been raided.

Newmarket voted down a by-law to enter into a five years' contract for power with the York Radial. The vote was 227 for and 248 against. A more attractive offer for the supply of hydro electric helped defeat the by-law, which, while it is not an actual acceptance of the hydro power, it is likely to go that way. All members of the council, with one exception, were in favor of the radial proposal. The defeat of the by-law is more than a local victory for the hydro, as Aurora and other places along the Radial line will accept their power.

About 3,000 Toronto carpenters went on strike Saturday noon, and building operations in the city will be tied up for some time. They were getting 40 cents an hour, but demanded 45 cents. The master builders offered 42 cents. The offer was refused, and the strike declared. No permits will be granted and builders willing to pay the scale asked for will not secure help, the ultimatum being that no permits should be issued under any circumstances till the employers as a body come to terms. Should the strike continue three or four weeks it is estimated that 12,000 additional men will be forced to be idle, as the activities of many depend upon the progress made by the carpenters.

The largest gathering in the history of the Canadian Press Association is assembled in Toronto this week, and an interesting and practical program is being ably discussed. The Newspaper Press from Halifax to Vancouver is interested in this annual gathering, which every year becomes more popular.

The regular business sessions are held in the King Edward hotel. A banquet given by the city of Toronto was held Tuesday night at McConkey's, presided over by Mayor Hocken. Among the speakers were Hon. W. H. Hearst, and N. W. Rowell, leader of the Ontario Opposition. The Royal Canadian Yacht Club extended the courtesy of a three hours' sail on their magnificent fleet to all members and their lady friends. On Wednesday afternoon the ladies will be given an auto trip around the city, and entertained and lunched by the golf club. A three days' trip to Porcupine from Wednesday evening at 7.30 till Saturday evening at 7, is an interesting close of the proceedings.
