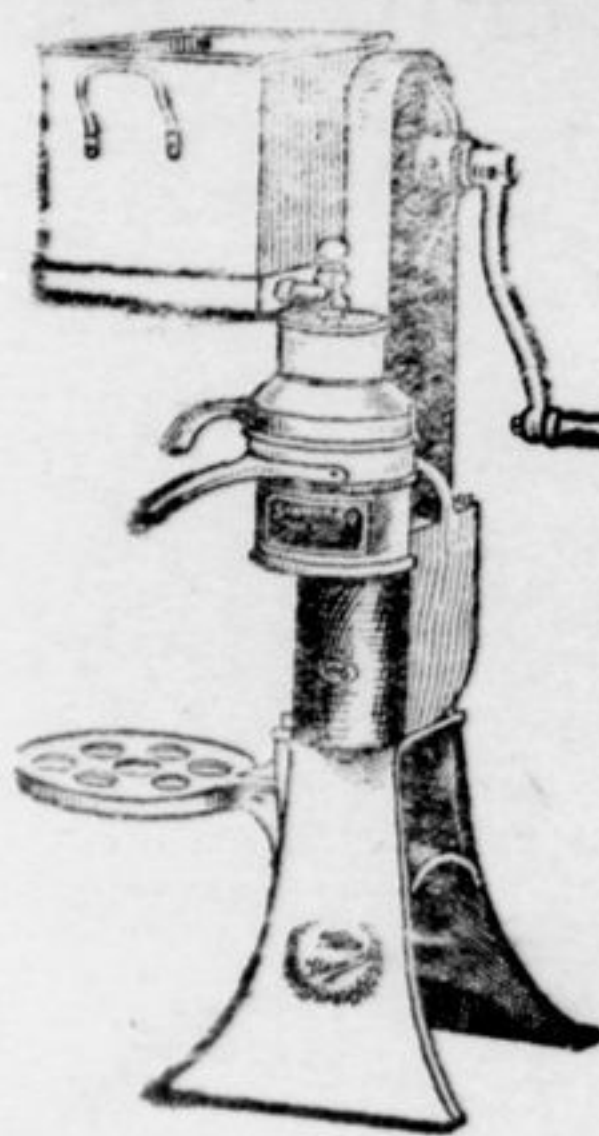

Round About Us

Rev. and Mrs. Geo. Lee, of Alliston, celebrated their golden wedding on the 21st of May.

Samuel J. Fluker, of Bowmanville, has leased the Grand Central hotel at Orangeville.

Acton council has reduced the cigarette license fee. In May 1912 it was \$75; this was cut down to \$37.50 and again to \$20.

Rev. W. H. Langton, of Leith, Ont., has accepted a call from the Chesley Baptist church, and will commence on July 1.

There wasn't a single appeal at the Chesley Court of Revision. The total assessment reached to more than \$700,000, and the council presented the assessor with a new hat for his good work.

Miss R. A. Dugit, M.A. a former teacher in Chesley High school, has been engaged as Classical teacher in Parkdale Collegiate Institute. The initial salary is \$1,600.

Meaford has abandoned the idea of a Dominion Day celebration. Bradford council has resolved to reorganize the fire brigade. Five men will be engaged at a salary of \$18 a year each, and these will have complete control.

A double-header C.P.R. train was stalled by caterpillars near Calabogie. About three miles of track were covered, and when the train stopped it was unable to start again till the track was cleared by section men.

The vicinity of Blytheswood and Staples, near Leamington, was visited Friday night by a severe storm. The storm was of short duration, but did a great deal of damage to farm crops and buildings. Hailstones as large as walnuts fell so plentifully as to nearly cover the ground. Barns were blown down, and others were destroyed by lightning.

A bee sting over the left eye caused the death of John Peff, a prominent farmer of North Easthope township. Deceased had attended church and was apparently in the best of health. Twenty minutes after a bee had stung him he was dead. The family physician believes that the poison entered an artery and spread rapidly to the heart, causing death instantly.—Shelburne Economist.

The assessor's figures show the present population of Walkerton to be 3,135. As the statistics last year placed the population at 3,077 this is a net gain of 58 during the year. As almost every other town and village in Bruce has shown a decrease during the same period, it is pleasing to note that Walkerton has made a very significant increase, and can count more heads to the square inch than formerly.

Mrs. Jas. Tutton, of Pleasant Grove, about five miles south of Galt fell into her cistern on May 29. She was about 25 years of age, and ready to go to a granite shower at a neighbor's house that afternoon. When her sister called to accompany her the baby was found dressed in the sitting room and the mother missing. She kept butter in a bucket in the cistern, suspended by a rope, and it is supposed the rope broke and she accidentally fell in.

Wm. Stock, a teamster, working for Goudy Bros., Guelph, was killed in a runaway accident. While unloading slabs at the G.T.R. siding, the horses took fright at a shunting car, and bolted down an incline. The driver's feet caught in a binding rope when he fell, and he was dragged head downward for some distance. The wagon struck a tree, which pitched him off, and he was trampled to death by the horses.

While on a visit to her sister, Miss Fulton, of 87 Wood street, Toronto, Mrs. Wesley, wife of the owner of The Bruce Herald and Times, of Walkerton, died suddenly. Mrs. Wesley had been in Toronto about a week, and was in the best of health about supper time. She had been laughing and joking with her friends a few moments before she went upstairs. When she got to her room she collapsed, and in a short time she was dead. A doctor was called and pronounced heart trouble as the cause of her death.

Hugh Falconer, J.P., Shelburne, and Stewart Tate, J.P., Grand Valley, were in Orangeville Tuesday trying liquor charges against the Messrs. Morrison senior and junior and Bennett, hotelkeepers. The charge against Morrison, jr., was deemed proven, and a fine of \$125 and costs or three months in jail imposed, while the charge against Morrison, sr., was withdrawn. There were two charges against Bennett. On one he was fined \$125 and costs or three months in jail and the other charge was withdrawn.—Shelburne Economist.

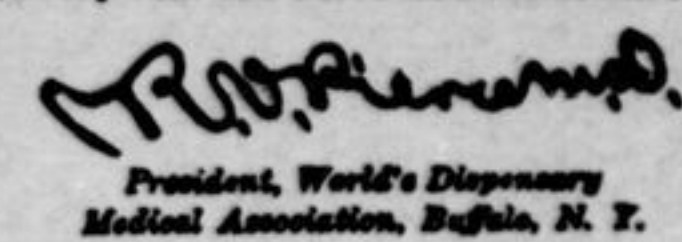
