WHAT IS THE SPEED LIMIT?

Scarcely a day passes but reports of auto accidents appear in the public press. Of late a number of youngsters have been run over, and killed. In some cases the child ran out thoughtlessly in front of the moving car, and before the driver had time to act the young life was crushed out. No one was to blame in particular and in most cases the driver was exonerated. There is a class of youngsters, however, that need to be taken in hand by their parents or other authorities to save them from getting into trouble. We refer to the young dare-devils who rush in front of autos, bicycles or other conveyances, and who frequently put the driver to annoyance and inconvenience. We have some of them right here in Durham, and if they meet with an accident they will have only themselves to blame for it. While drivers of autos, motorcycles and fast-moving conveyances are often reckless they are not always guilty of accidents that occur.

We have had several complaints lately about the speed of autoists going through town, and have been asked why the town-constable doesn't exercise his power and make them conform to the law. We don't know what speed the law allows, and for this reason we are not able to answer some of the enquiries. We know there is a limit on the city streets as instances are often recorded of drivers being jerked up for overspeeding. If some person who knows the law will advise us we will be able to tell all enquirers. In the city, automobiles seem to go at a pretty good clip, running side by side with the street cars for long distances at a time. They are not allowed, however, to pass a car while standing, and this order is pretty well observed. It may be that local car-owners do not know how fast they are allowed to travel but ignorance of the law is no use before a court of justice. It is a difficult matter to say with a degree of accuracy, how fast, per hour, a car is traveling at any point, and few of us could care to state under oath the speed of a passing car. The person who has the speedometer before him is the only one who can tell within miles of the actual rate travelled.

THE NEW CURFEW LAW

Children under sixteen must remain at home after nine o'clock in the evening and if, after that hour, a child is found on the streets in the parks without a parent or guardian, the parent of such child is liable to a fine. That is, in short, the substance of the new amendments to the Children's Protection Act which became law at a recent session of the Ontario Parliament. Much has been said and written about children on the streets at night and the new act is the result of an agitation for more stringent legislation. The amended law is as follows:—Sec. (1) No child, under sixteen, shall loiter in any public place after nine o'clock in the evening, or there unless accompanied by a parent or guardian or an adult appointed by the parent or guardian to accompany such child. (2) A child found in a public place after nine o'clock in the evening, or there unless accompanied by a parent or guardian or an adult appointed by the parent or guardian to accompany such child, shall be liable to a fine not exceeding \$10 for the first offence, and \$20 for a second offence, and \$50 for a third, or any subsequent offence. Sec. 2. (k) "Public Place" means a street, highway or other place, whether a thoroughfare, or a tavern or other place of public resort, and, generally, any place to which the public have access.

GLENELG COUNCIL.

The council met pursuant to adjournment, all the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed. Communications read as follows: Angus McArthur and Henry Sealey, claim for sheep killed by dogs; N. S. Dunlop, withdrawing C.P.R. appeal against assessment; John Kennedy, informing council of his inability to act as pathmaster; The Municipal World, account for supplies; the reeve and clerk, report re legal accounts; J.A. McDonald, claim for balance of salary for assessor and services under School Act.

Lindsay-McMillan—That Angus McArthur be paid \$10.65, being two-thirds value of sheep killed by dogs in 1912.—Carried.

McMillan-Lindsay—That Henry Sealey be paid \$1.65, being two-thirds value of sheep killed by dogs.—Carried.

McMillan-Young—That the reeve be appointed to meet James Atkinson re subway on gravel road opposite lot 56, to consider what repairs are required.—Carried.

Peart-Young—That I. B. Lucas be paid \$60 disbursements and services re Haw case, and \$15 for general services for years 1910, 1911 and 1912. Total, \$75.—Carried.

Lindsay-McMillan—That the Municipal World be paid \$5.18 for municipal supplies.—Carried.

Peart-Young—That Committee Works be paid for as follows: The reeve, McMillan and Lindsay committee on McGillivray bridge, \$1 each; the reeve and McMillan re Glen road, \$1 each; the reeve and clerk, trip to Markdale, \$1 each.—Carried.

Lindsay-McMillan—That members of the local Board of Health, the reeve, clerk and Geo. Binnie, be paid \$2 each for meeting held on May 17.—Carried.

McMillan-Lindsay—That \$50 be granted to repair the road at lots 15 and 16, con. 1, E.G.R.—Carried.

Lindsay-Young—That teams be paid 35c. an hour while working on the roads, and that commissioners be paid \$2 per day.—Carried.

Lindsay-McMillan—That the clerk be paid \$7.34 for postage, express charges and telephone.—Carried.

Lindsay-Peart—That W.S. Perkins be paid \$1 for oil stove, and W. H. Arrowsmith 10 cents for oil.

COURT OF REVISION.
The council then organized as a Court of Revision, with Mr. Nichol in the chair, when complaints were heard and changes made as follows: Chas. Mortley, lot 2 of 5, con. 1, E.G.R., reduced to \$400; T. G. Lauder, \$50 taken off north 50; S. Martin, assessment allowed to stand; T. and J. Timmons, lot 20, con. 2, reduced to \$200; J. Meagher, lot 15, con. 4, N.D.R., \$100 struck off; Lot 26, con. 5, assessed to Geo. Campbell as tenant. With these changes the assessment roll was passed and ordered to be certified to by the clerk as the assessment roll for 1913.

Lindsay-Peart—That the assessor be paid the balance of his salary, \$25, and also \$5 for taking school census, and \$5 for equalizing school No. 10, and \$2 for postage. Total, \$37.—Carried.

McMillan-Peart—That the clerk be paid \$50 on salary.—Carried.

The council adjourned to July 5, at 10 a.m. —J.S. Black, Clerk.




