The bye-election in North Grey on Monday last added C. S. Cameron to the Conservative side of the Ontario Legislature. Since the general election in November, 1911 six by-elections have been held. and every one resulted in a Conservative victory, East Middlesex and North Grey being Conservative gains. Mr. Cameron's majority over John McQuaker was 278. a tremendous overturn from Mr. MacKay's majority of 741 last election. 
