FLESHERTON.

Mr. Gervis Hazard, employed as section man C.P.R., at Flesherton Station, met with sudden death from heart failure on Tuesday evening of last week. Returning from work with others, he complained of not feeling well and in a minute or two expired on the track. The body was conveyed to his late home on Stone's line, and was a great shock to his family, especially to his wife, who received the sad news at Owen Sound, where she was visiting.
