NOT WHAT HE HAD SUPPOSED.

That a mighty lot of delusion concerning the intense cold and frightful blizzards of the Arctic regions is entertained by the average timorous stay-at-home, is the assertion of explorer Stefanson, he of blonde Eskimo fame. According to Mr. Stefanson, Manitoba has lower minimum temperatures in winter than Hershel Island, a whaler's rendezvous about 1,000 miles further north, in the Arctic ocean. "And yet," says the explorer, "the Manitoba cold seldom prevents the young people of the farm from riding in singing sleds to dances six or ten miles away—clad, too, in clothing inferior to that worn by the poorest Eskimo in similar temperatures and under similar conditions. If we should grant, then, that the people born in Manitoba and the people who have settled the province, are presumably as intelligent as the Englishmen, Italians, Norwegians and others who go on polar voyages, why do we have shelves full of the horrors of Arctic cold and not a pamphlet on the horrors of Winnipeg in winter? It may be partly because Canadians do not like to scare off prospective immigrants, but it is more largely that the terrors of '50 below' are not so impressive when we have the companion picture of little girls toddling to school and the traffic of city streets uninterrupted. "I have no desire to class with May zephyrs the storms that sweep across our ice fields and tundras on the north coast in February and March; however, in two winters north of the Arctic circle I have not seen a storm that quite equalled any one of half a dozen blizzards remembered from 20 years in North Dakota and Manitoba. And yet my parents and our neighbors brought up large families in comfort in a country subject to such storms and such cold—just as Eskimos bring up their families in comfort and take care of their sick and aged among similar storms at the mouth of the Mackenzie river."

THE HEN.
