

THE GAME LAWS.

Magistrates and others pointing copies of the statutes at length these days for information by sportsmen. The following are of interest to this class:

Open season for the following game:

Grouse, pheasants, prairie or partridge, from the 15th of October to the 15th day of November, both days inclusive; person shall take or kill than ten partridges in a day.

Woodcock, from the 1st of October to 15th November, days inclusive.

Quail, wild turkeys, bluish grey squirrels, from the 1st of October to 15th December, both inclusive, in this territory.

Hares and cotton-tail from October 1st to 15th December, days inclusive.

Ducks, or other water snipe, rail, plover, from 1st of October to 15th December, days inclusive, in this territory.

No muskrat shall be hunted or taken, or had in possession, person between the 1st of May and the 1st day of December.

No mink shall be hunted or taken, or had in possession, any person between the 1st of May and the 1st day of November.

No person shall on the day, hunt, take, kill or use any game, or use any other engine for that purpose.

No eggs of any game shall be taken, destroyed, in possession by any person, at any time.

Shooting between sunrise and sunset is forbidden.
