BY-ELECTIONS ON OCTOBER 21.

Ottawa, Sept. 23.—The date for the East Middlesex by-election has been fixed for Tuesday, October 21, with nominations a week earlier, October 14. Mr. W. B. Harding, of Thorndale, will act as returning officer.

The Chateaugay date is Saturday, October 11, with nominations on October 4. J. E. C. Burnbray, of Chateaugay, is the returning officer.

The East Middlesex seat was made vacant by the death of Peter Elson, whose majority at the general election was 681. Mr. Frank Glass is the Conservative nominee and Mr. R. G. Fisher is the Liberal.

The Chateaugay seat was made vacant by the death of J. P. Brown, Liberal. Mr. Brown's majority at the general election was any person but one of that politics, the majorities in recent years running as high as 420. In 1908 Mr. Brown's majority was 305.

The dates of South Bruce and North Lanark elections were not fixed.
