UNSCIENTIFIC BOUNDARY.

Commenting on the 100 years of Peace between Canada and the United States, an American paper says: By far the longest "unscientific" boundary in the world divides us from British America. It cuts across mountain chains east and west, where nature has grooved the inevitable paths of men north and south; and the close neighborhood thus enforced by geography has thriven and ripened in vast trade, in common prosperity, in growing esteem. No part frowns along this line, no navies confront each other on the lakes, where the example of disarmament by agreement has long been set for all the world.

NEVER CROSS FRONTIER.

One feature in which the Russian frontier differs from others is the complete ignorance of those living near the border of what lies beyond. A correspondent of the Autocar says that he called at the Automobile Club in Breslau, hoping to gain some information. "The members received me most kindly and did all they could to help, but explained that they never crossed the frontier, and had no first-hand knowledge. The German customs officer, living for years within yards of Russia, spoke no word of Russian, and the Russians beyond the chain spoke no German."

"There is a neutral strip, some three or four yards wide between Russia and Germany, along which many Russian sentries are posted and mounted Cossacks pass at short intervals riding the boundary."

Certainly, judging from actual facts, the Fielding-Paterson trade proposal was a move in the right direction, at all events from the Ontario farmers' point of view.
