SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or any male over 15 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at the office of any Local Agent of Dominion Lands (not sub-agent), on certain conditions. Duties.—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required in every case, except when residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along-side his homestead. Price \$3 per acre. Duties.—Six months residence in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and 50 acres extra cultivation. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land after report by Homestead Inspector on application for patent.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price, \$3 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

SHORT BITS OF LIVE NEWS

Short bits of live news. Important changes in the Militia Department are announced. A nine-year-old boy admitted stealing letters from Ingersoll post office.

The Champlain monument for Ottawa will be erected at Nepean Point. Cobourg town council has been petitioned to submit a local option by-law.

Severe gales swept the lakes and blizzards were experienced in the west the first of the week. General Bramwell Booth received a hearty welcome at Winnipeg on behalf of the west.

The steamer Keyvive has reached Thorold with a load of sulphite pulp from Sweden. Hon Mr. Hearst, Provincial Minister of Crown Lands, addressed Ottawa Canadian Club on Saturday.

During October the public debt of Canada increased by \$1,540,262; in October, 1912, it decreased by \$4,022,098. The French fruit crop, except for apples and grapes, is much below the average, and Canadian fruit is in demand.

Mrs. Susan Woodruff, of St. Catharines, is dead from a fractured skull received in a runaway accident in Muskoka. Alex. Martin, who was terribly burned by gasoline at the Pere Marquette coal hoist at Blenheim on Friday, succumbed.

Fifty thousand small mouthed black bass have just been deposited in Lake Scugog between Port Perry and Washburn Island. Stratford rejected a by-law to spend \$20,000 on new fire apparatus, and another to guarantee the bonds of the Avon Hosiery Co.

It is said that the Crown will pay the expenses of Mrs. Grace Beemer, who has been acquitted on a murder charge at Woodstock. Sir Wm. Lever has purchased 600 feet water frontage at Barnaby, B.C., with the object of building a model city on the lines of Port Sunlight.

Alex. Morrison, Conservative, was unseated on corruption charges in the recent Macdonald bye-election. Fire at Nepegon, 60 miles east of Fort William, breaking out Saturday night, destroyed 12 stores.

John McFarlane, of Leesboro, West Nisour, was nominated as Conservative candidate for the Provincial Legislature, in the bye-election for East Middlesex. Frank Tremblay, traffic manager of the Port Arthur Steel Railway, pursued on his bicycle and captured an Italian who fatally shot another one in a fight.

Voting on the Canada Temperance Act in Welland, Peel and Huron has been postponed from November 24, as announced from Ottawa last week, to January 29. Dean Starr was elected president of Kingston Historical Society, which will publish documentary volumes of the religious, social and political history of the city.

Humberto California, an Italian, was taken to Montreal hospital early on Sunday with a bullet that penetrated his left lung and spine. He refused to say how it had happened. A fifty-mile gale lashed Lake Superior on Saturday and Sunday. More than 50 steamers are in shelter between the Soo and Whitefish Point.

George Tracey, aged 52, a coal dealer, of Halifax, was killed by a train while accompanying a young woman home. In 1888 he won the American half-mile running championship. The entry of the Western Union Telegraph Company into Alberta through an arrangement with the Alberta Government, will probably be vigorously opposed by the Telegraphers' Union.

Track-laying on the extension of Toronto Railway from St. Catharines to Niagara-on-the-Lake is senger service will be opened in two weeks. J. Duffy, night operator at Ridgeway, was convicted of having been accessory of Ernest Clark who held him up and got \$38. Duffy gets three months; Clark, who attempted suicide in jail, will be examined by a doctor.

Speaking at the 59th anniversary services of St. Thomas' Miller, Rev. Dr. J. O. said that the Canadian municipal government system was not the best method of bringing out good men for office. Mrs. E. A. Titus of Wellington, 38 years ago, when attending Picton Fair, lost her purse containing two \$5 gold pieces and some silver money. Now she has received \$7, returned conscience money. The letter was mailed at Adolphustown.

It is not expected that the Government will next session act on the report of the Technical Education Commission. For one thing, Prof. Robertson, chairman of the commission, has been asked to confer with the Manitoba authorities. The historic old church of St. Mark's, Niagara-on-the-Lake, has just completed the celebration of the 25th anniversary of the appointment of its rector, Rev. Canon Garrett, and he was presented with an illuminated address and gold headed.

Huron county Laymen's Missionary conference is being held at Goderich. Patrick Cunningham of Cobourg was killed on a level crossing of the G. T. R. Fire in the stables at Appleby school, near Oakville, caused \$6,000 loss one night last week.

Randolph Edwards, aged 16, of Halifax, shot himself in the railway waiting room at Truro. A gale, with rain, hail, snow and thunder, tied up navigation in the vicinity of Port William. The Whitby jury in the case of Stead Gamble, the Toronto labor leader, disagreed.

Wm. Davis, formerly of Toronto, has been appointed deputy chief of police at Edmonton. Major John Clark, one of Brandon's oldest citizens, is dead. He was born near Orillia 50 years ago. The British shipbuilding firm of Armstrong, Whitworth & Co. is planning to establish a Canadian plant.

John Lowe, who was deputy minister of agriculture, retiring in 1895, is dead at Ottawa in his 90th year. For the second time in six years Brantford's police magistrate had no prisoner to face him on Friday. Wm. Tennent, a Mason for 67 years, died at Belleville, at the age of 87, where he lived 63 years.

Five hundred gallons of dirty milk were rejected last week by Montreal's Food Inspection Department. A. E. Johnstone, a farmer of Charlestown, has been appointed postmaster at Athens, succeeding Mrs. J. H. McLaughlin, retired.

The National Council of women intends to apply for incorporating the council to federate all women's societies in the Dominion. Capt. Cole, a schooner skipper arriving at Quebec from Gaspé, announces a disease among the herring which will likely affect other fish also.

A squad of Quebec firemen were rushed by special train to Chateau Richer, 15 miles distant, only to find that a woodshed had been on fire. An eastbound Grand Trunk Rail, way freight train ran into an open switch and crashed into a way freight at Baden, due to a brakeman's negligence.

Jas. J. Hill, at Vancouver, says there is not the slightest probability of the railway to the Yukon being built with money supplied by the Standard Oil Trust. Counsel for 38 Hindus, awaiting deportation at Vancouver, will argue that the regulation that they each must have \$200 before landing in Canada is ultra vires.

The floor of the new labor temple in Guelph sank about six inches in the rear of the auditorium just before the opening of a concert one night last week. The concert was postponed. A corporation, with a stock of \$1,000,000, was organized in Winnipeg for the manufacture and sale of a general utility gasoline tractor on three wheels.

The steamer Bridgeport, of the Dominion Coal Co., which left the Sydney, C. B., on Saturday week for Quebec, with a cargo, has not since been heard of. She is now nine days overdue. Fire destroyed the stables of the Windsor hotel at Colborne, with a horse and cow owned by Palmeret and Son and the stage team owned by Peter Cockburn. It spread ago and burned Henry Carroll's residence. Austin McClinton broke a leg when a ladder collapsed.

For the alleged non-delivery of a telegram, sent from Mission Texas to Windsor, last February, C. J. Netting demands \$10,000 from the Western Union Telegraph Company in a suit started in Detroit. James Roddick, keeper of the Gull Light, near Cobourg, has been dismissed, and Samuel Nicholls appointed in his stead. The Roddick family has cared for the light for 60 years.

The Canadian Pacific Railway on Sunday invaded the churches of Montreal with an appeal for assistance to stop or at least lessen an appalling loss of life on the system in eastern Canada. Rev. J. L. Flanagan, of the Church of the Ascension, endorsed the appeal. The Ontario Lake Front Terminal Railway is applying to Parliament for authority to construct a branch railway from Havelock, on the C. P. R., via Campbellford, to Cobourg and Brighton.

Speaking at Minnedosa, Premier Roblin of Manitoba, announced that \$2,500,000 would be spent on good roads, and would erect a public abattoir at the new Union Stock Yards, Wm. Waddell, ex-M. P. P. was nominated for the bye-election. While pouring gasoline to start a natural gas engine at the Pere Marquette coal hoist at Blenheim, Alexander Martin let the liquid overflow, causing an explosion and fire. He was badly burned, and the hoist was destroyed, loss \$50,000.
