FLESHERTON.
After many years of illness borne with great fortitude and Christian resignation, Mrs. Thomas Bentham passed peacefully away at her late home at Chatsworth, on Tuesday, November 18, aged 57 years. The remains were brought to Flesherton to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Richard Bentham, where 31 years ago, the deceased, whose maiden name was Lesia Charlton, was married to her surviving sorrowing husband, who devoted all his energies for her comfort and restoration to health during the 15 years she was an invalid. On Friday afternoon the public cemetery laid at rest in the public cemetery here. Service was held at the house, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Mr. Owen, who preached an impressive sermon from Isa. 55: 6, 7, the text which had been chosen by her, and her favorite hymns were also sung. Mr. Owen paid a fitting tribute to the memory of the deceased, who had been for many years a faithful member of the Methodist church, a saintly woman whose Godly life was an influence for good in the community.
