During the past year, 200 houses were built in Pembroke at an average cost of \$2,000 each. Plans have been prepared showing that a sewage disposal system for Barrie would cost \$60,000. A big "abolish the bar" convention will be held at Calgary on February 18. The C.N.R. is reported to be negotiating for the Quebec and Saguenay Railway.
