FOUND INFANT'S BODY.
 Stef Redies, a Hungarian
 moulder, working at the malleable
 iron plant down the east shore,
 found the body of a female child
 in the waters of the bay at a
 point just opposite the works,
 while wandering along the shore
 about ten o'clock on Sunday fore-
 noon. He at once went and noti-
 fied Blake Kompf, an Owen
 Sounder whom he knew, and the
 latter at once went down and then
 the body from the water and Dr. Dow-
 and the latter communicated with
 County Constable C. C. Pearce.
 The body was removed to the
 next morning and viewed the jury
