Fireproof Clothing

At an exposition held in Canada recently, a demonstrator how to make fireproof clothing. He poured from one pound to a gallon of cold water in a solution of ammonium phosphate. Then he took an 8-inch strip of ordinary cotton gauze and dipped it in the ammonium phosphate solution. He dried it with an electric fan and held it in a flame for thirty seconds, but it did not . burn. He took another strip of gauze that had not been treated with the solution, and on igniting it burned in four seconds. He advised that the whole family washing should be made fireproof. The expense for an average sized family would be about 15 cents a week.
