British Attack on Tigris Front Fails Because of Floods


Lieut.-General Sir Percy Lake, Commander of the British forces in Mesopotamia, reports on Monday that the British attack on the Turkish position at Sannayyat, on the Tigris River just below Kut-el-Amara, failed. The British are attempting the relief of the force under General Townshend, besieged at Kut-el-Amara. The statement says: "No attack on Sannayyat was made on April 6, as reported in the Turkish communication of April 10 (9th). Sir Percy Lake reports that an attack made at dawn on the 9th failed to get through the enemy's lines. The operations were much hampered by floods, which are extending.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section o available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan, or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain condi-


Duties .- Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties .- Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent. also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption
