BIGGEST BUDGET IN HISTORY OF WORLD

Britain Bears Enormous Burdens Cheerfully and Prosperously—Sixty-five Million Pounds Extra Revenue

Faced by the problem of financing for another year a war costing Great Britain £5,000,000 daily, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, Reginald McKenna, was met at the outset by two favorable circumstances, namely, that owing to the expansive power of British trade, the revenue for the year exceeded the estimated revenue by £22,000,000, while the year's expenditure has been £31,000,000 below the estimate. Resolutions authorizing the new taxes and increases were formally agreed to in the Commons on Tuesday. By imposing new taxes on amusements, railway tickets, matches and mineral waters, and raising a number of the old taxes, including those on excess war profits, incomes, sugar, cocoa, coffee and motor cars, the Chancellor estimates that he will be able to raise about £65,000,000, which is nearly double what many persons believed he could raise by this means.

Compared With Germany

The Chancellor made an interesting comparison with German finance, declaring that while Great Britain was raising more than £300,000,000 annually by taxation, the secretary of the German Imperial Treasury, Dr. Helfferich, was announcing a "doubtful increase" of £24,000,000. Explaining his financial methods, Mr. McKenna indicated his desire to avoid anything requiring new machinery for its collection, which would prove costly and wasteful. Equally, he desired to distribute the necessary burdens fairly. He said he was aware of no historical parallel for the willingness displayed by the people of Great Britain to submit cheerfully to the taxgatherers' "exactions." He had resisted suggestions for an excessive increase in the tax on excess war profits, because he considered this would have the effect of restricting trading enterprises. On the question of the general tariff, which has been the subject of earnest discussion in political circles, Mr. McKenna put aside any idea that the Government had yet been converted to that means for raising revenue or breaking enemy competition.

BRITISH LEFT TO DIE

German Doctors as Heartless as Heads of Horrible Prison

The Government committee on the treatment in Germany of British prisoners of war has issued a report on the conditions in the Wittenberg Camp during the typhus epidemic of last year. The report is based on information from repatriated prisoners, and especially from Major Priestley, Captain Vidal and Captain Lauder of the Army Medical Corps. The three officers mentioned are the only survivors of six British doctors sent to the Wittenberg Camp by the Germans, "to take up," says the report, "the place of duty abandoned by their own (German) Medical Staff when the presence of typhus manifested itself." The records of the epidemic kept by the British officers were taken from them before their departure from Germany, but the report gives in detail the condition of the camp and the treatment of prisoners and patients, which the American Ambassador, James W. Gerard, said was "even more unfavorable than I had been led to expect." There are 15,000 and sometimes more prisoners in the camp, which the committee says, "is an enormous population for so restricted an area as ten and a half acres." There were no proper heating arrangements and the men were insufficiently clothed. Many had neither boots nor socks. There was an insufficient supply of water and soap, and Major Priestley says he found the men "gaunt, of a peculiar gray pallor and verminous." The supply of food was also insufficient, even in the hospital, until supplies arrived from England.

Aliens to Aid Farmers

Thousands of Interned Enemies to Harvest Western Crops

A Winnipeg despatch on Monday said: A meeting in connection with the proposal to release a large number of interned aliens from detention camps in order that they may aid farmers in operations of the present year was held here. Those present included Major-General Otter, who is in general charge of the detention camps of the Dominion; officials of the C.P.R., C.N.R., Bankers' Association and Grain Growers' Association. It was arranged that as the list of available men in the camp at Brandon was exhausted, special trains would be operated from Cochrane west, and if necessary, 2,000 men would be brought from the camps near that place to Brandon. The cost of this transportation may be borne by the Federal Government. Farmers using this labor will be required to take each man for a period of seven months, to pay the current rate of wages, and to report once a month to the Commandant of the camp.

Canadians Reach England

Two Toronto and a Western Battalion at Grayshot Camp

Official notification of the safe arrival in England of the 74th and 75th Infantry Battalions from Toronto and the 55th Infantry Battalion from Calgary and Saskatoon has been received. These battalions crossed the Atlantic on the C.P.R. liner Empress of Britain, which sailed from Halifax on Thursday, March 30. The Toronto troops are quartered at Grayshot Camp, which is in the Aldershot district and adjacent to Bramshott Camp.

Col. Frederick Ford of Canada was given a C.M.G. by King George.

ALL-DAY HUN DRIVES REPULSED AT VERDUN

Attackers Used Mass Formations After French Cleverly Avoided Bethincourt Trap

The British official communication issued Monday night says: "Last night at St. Eloi our troops attacked and captured the mine crater remaining in German hands, and by a further attack succeeded in establishing themselves in German trenches running southwest from the above crater. Today there has been artillery activity about La Boisselle, Angres, Vierstraat, St. Eloi and Ypres. There was some mining activity about La Boisselle, Rocourt and Givenchy."

The French have abandoned the Bethincourt salient according to the midnight official statement from Paris Sunday night. The Bethincourt salient was a sharp angle of the French front that projected into the German line of attack for a depth of about two miles. The evacuation was carried out Saturday night, and throughout today the Germans have furiously attacked the new French line, which has been straightened out, broadly speaking, from Avocourt to Cumeres. The assault extended with the utmost violence along the whole front west of the Meuse. The centre of the heaviest attacks was the Cumeres-Mort Homme front. Here the Germans once more resumed the mass formation. It was fatal, for the dense columns were swept away by machine gun fire, and the Germans were driven back, leaving hundreds of dead. Everywhere, indeed, along the whole line the Germans were repulsed with heavy losses, except at one point. That was northeast of Avocourt, and there, the French admit, the Germans succeeded in entering the French line, only, however, to be immediately ejected by a counter-attack. Northeast of Verdun, around Pepper Hill and on the Douaumont-Vaux sector the Germans heavily bombarded French positions, but were unable to launch an infantry attack. The capture of 150 metres of German trenches southwest of Douaumont is reported by Paris.

The British official communication, issued Friday night, said: "Yesterday at St. Eloi the enemy succeeded in regaining a portion of the ground we captured March 27. The fighting continues. Last night, after a very heavy bombardment, a small enemy raiding party entered one of our trenches north of the River Ancre, but was quickly driven out. Today there has been artillery activity about Souchez, Aix-Neufville, St. Eloi and Ypres." Apparently referring to those same engagements the Berlin official report stated: "German troops, after careful preparation and tenacious fighting, conquered British crater positions south of St. Eloi, defended by Canadian troops."

MADMAN SLEW FAMILY

Six Persons Shot, Farm Buildings and Stock Burned

A whole family of six was wiped out in the Wakaw district near Saskatoon when Prokup Manchure, his wife, brother-in-law, and three children, were murdered, the house burned over their dying bodies, their animals shot down and left to perish in the burning buildings. The crime was evident; committed by a madman. The mounted police of the whole district have been detailed to search all over scattered over the whole countryside. After the murder of the human inhabitants on the homestead, the miscreant evidently started in on the live stock of the farm, for three head of oxen were found outside the barn shot dead. Among the buildings burned were two granaries, one containing 1,000 bushels of wheat, two barns, in one of which six head of horses perished in the fire, and in the other two head of cattle. The mounted police have but little to work on. The family were noted throughout the district as being quiet and law abiding.

Advancing Toward Kut

Relief Force Nearing the Besieged Garrison Under Gen. Townshend

The British War Office continuing its official account of the capture of Umm-el-Henna and Felahie in the Mesopotamia advance of Lieut-Gen. Sir George F. Goringe, describes the fighting in which that force is now engaged. Gen. Goringe is pressing to the relief of the 10,000 men under General Townshend, besieged at Kut-el-Amara by the Turks. He is now within twenty miles of the beleaguered city. The War Office statement says: "The Felahie position consisted of several lines of deep trenches. The northern flank rested on the Sannayyat swamps and the southern on the Tigris. The situation is somewhat complicated by the continuance of stormy weather and the fact that the floods in the Tigris are increasing."

Relief Force Checked

British Attack on Tigris Front Fails Because of Floods

Lieut-General Sir Percy Lake, Commander of the British forces in Mesopotamia, reports on Monday that the British attack on the Turkish position at Sannayyat, on the Tigris River just below Kut-el-Amara, failed. The British are attempting the relief of the force under General Townshend, besieged at Kut-el-Amara. The statement says: "No attack on Sannayyat was made on April 6, as reported in the Turkish communication of April 10 (9th). Sir Percy Lake reports that an attack made at dawn on the 9th failed to get through the enemy's lines. The operations were much hampered by floods, which are extending."

A manifesto was issued by the British Board of Trade on Monday urging the most drastic economy in the use of coal. Eleven Asiatics were drowned when the P. & O. steamer Simla was sunk in the Mediterranean.

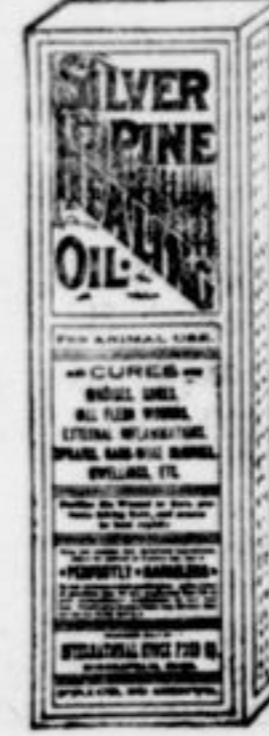

A NEW FLY CATCHER

A new device for catching flies is being added to the equipment of a number of hotels in preparation for the summer season. It consists of an electric motor which draws the flies by a strong current to a pipe. Molasses or moistened sugar is smeared on the edge to draw them to the vicinity. As the flies alight on the pipe a strong suction seizes them and quickly drops them into a steel cage in the bottom of the pipe. This machine has demonstrated an ability to capture over a hundred flies a minute.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan, or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent, also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. W. W. CORY, C.M.G.
