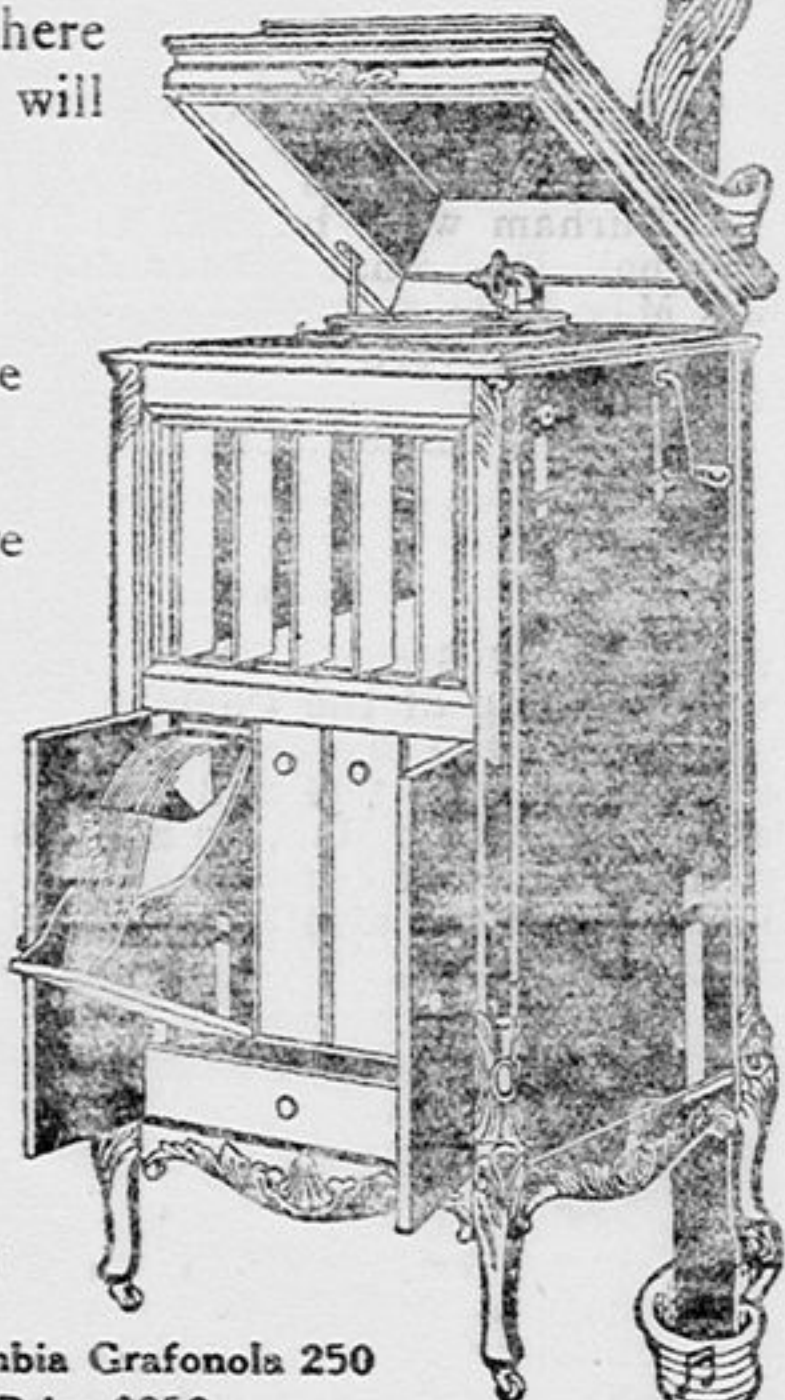

FLESHERTON

Mrs. Hawkin, Sr., relict of the late Robert Hawkin, an old resident of Artemesia and a highly respected woman, passed away after a brief illness at her late home on the 8th Concession, on Thursday, May 11th, in her 81st year. Mrs. Hawkins was a Methodist, and her pastor, Rev. Mr. Madden, officiated at the funeral, which took place on Saturday afternoon to Salem Cemetery, where the deceased's husband was fourteen years ago interred. The deceased, whose maiden name was Selina Pedlar, was born in England, and came to Canada when quite young. She was married to Mr. Hawkin about sixty years ago, and since then lived almost constantly on the farm on which she died. She was a devoted wife and mother, and will be missed by her family, especially Joseph with whom she lived, and who is an invalid. She was always an energetic woman, fond of her home and travelled but little, never having journeyed on a railway train. She however had the pleasure of an auto outing last summer on the occasion of the visit of her nephew, Mr. Jos. Pedlar, who came from Nebraska in his car. Four sons and three daughters survive her, namely: Joseph and Samuel on the homestead; Thomas, at Epping; William, near Eugenia; Mrs. Joseph Sherwood, Rock Mills; Mrs. Wm. Saizgeon, Collingwood, and Mrs. Ephraim Doupe, near Flesherton. Mrs. Tucker Phillips is the only surviving sister of the deceased. Among the floral offerings was a beautiful anchor from the family.
