The Task Before Us

The splendid pageant of summer calls to us insistently in these golden days to enjoy the splendors of peace.

Even more insistently does the call come to put barriers to the march of evil men and to win a righteous war.

"Far from over," says a French statement in effect, "but our soldiers will hold fast to the end."

That view of the battle of Verdun applies aptly to all the Allies and to the general position of the war. Bent as we are on victory, we must pay the price. The price rises with time, and there is no escape from paying at compound interests for all past miscalculations and delays. Those alone will be justified who have taken the sternest view of the war and the extreme estimate of our needs.

Tremendous as is the renewed struggle for the natural bastions of Verdun, formidable as is the Austrian thrust through the Alps, even the events of the week are subordinate to its lessons. Ruthless is the answer of facts to those who have under-estimated the vitality and stubbornness of the Central Empires or the magnitude of the work before the Allies, and, above all, for Britain, both at home and in the field. Rejecting a bad peace, we must face the certainty of a long war. Nothing will win it but the utmost effort of our manufacturing power added to the rest.

We have still work to do as big as anything we have accomplished. It is a war of equipment, above all of heavy guns. We have to provide for our Allies as well as ourselves before the enemy can be finally overhauled.

Now that we have conscription we must ask ourselves what we are going to do with it, and we must remember that it is only the beginning of organization, that no mere numbers will sufficiently avail without more effective war-plans and war-direction. We must take more drastic measures to enforce economy amongst the masses as well as the classes, and to provide more shipping. We must dismiss premature dreams.

From now onwards we must prepare without the avoidable loss of a day for the campaign of 1917 and beyond. We must get ourselves into a position to concentrate with certainty next year the utmost of our equipment and fighting numbers upon the main European affair. These are the conditions of success in the long war which lies before us. Until these conditions are fulfilled the Allies' united offensive cannot

conquer, nor, indeed, can they grasp once for all the assured initiative which is the beginning of victory.

The enemy's military reserves will be sufficient for well into next year, perhaps longer. His power of manufacturing guns and ammunition is enormous. The peoples of the Central Empires suffer severe privation but we have no certainty whatever that their position in that respect will become impossible. As they have endured for nearly two years, they might endure in that respect for as long again. When once they began to lose, privation would accelerate the end, but as long as they think they are winning they will hold on. That is the only calculation upon which sane judgment can work in this country.

The plain and vital things we have to do without further mistake or illusion of any kind is to wear down the German offensive this year, when it is in some ways at the climax of its energy and re-

meanwhile the side-shows in the sources, to wind up resolutely East, and to prepare by every means the supreme effort of 1917, with a full recognition of the fact that the struggle may last more than three years, if we mean, as we do, to reject to the end all thought of a bad and disastrous peace.

The double onslaught on France and Italy is a weight and persistence strongly suggesting that the enemy's main effort in the present campaign will be made after all in the West and not in the East. That inference is not yet quite sure. Until the end of June we cannot take it for certain.

If present appearances are confirmed, two conclusions will follow and both are encouraging. It is far better for the general cause of the Allies that the Western Powers should bear the brunt, while Russia builds up her armaments to more than twice their present fighting strength. If Germany does not attack Russia it will be because the enemy knows that sufficient success on that side is no longer to be secured.

There is no solution against Russia backed by British sea-power, Germany is under no delusion about the meaning of that fact. She dreads above all things a combined offensive of all the Allies next year with Russia at full strength. If Germany, with her partners, must face at last another campaign under such conditions, she will do it with a mustering of her last resources for a defensive on all sides which in itself would mean a mighty effort before a collapse. But she is making supreme exertions to avert that ordeal. The attack on France and Italy is adopted as the only course open. If it fails to exhaust the one or to drive the other out of the war Germany knows well that her game will be up in the end, no matter how long it may take to play out.

If we read the situation aright, however methodical and powerful in form may be the Teutonic offensive on the Meuse and in the Alps—supposing it to be indeed the main motive of this year's fighting—it is in essence a plan of desperation.

Whether it is totally beaten or secures some local success Germany, we are convinced, will endeavor to negotiate on one basis or another a peace from which the standpoint of the Allies would be a bad peace, neither vindicating justice in the present nor establishing security for the future. Rather than concede the Allies' minimum terms, the enemy, as we have said, will fight to the last. Let there be no mistake about that. But the enemy none the less dreads, and well may, the last resort against the culminating campaigns of a long war in which the combined offensive of all the Allies would be brought to bear at last with a maximum strength of men and equipment.

The inwardness of the present situation then is that Germany wants by force or guile before the end of the year a peace with all the Allies, or some of them—a peace saving the prestige of the German war-lord and the German war caste before the risk of having to pay the final penalty becomes imminent and deadly in a struggle prolonged beyond this year.

We must not underestimate this plan either on its military or its political side, but we have always held it to be a plan that would fail. If Germany cannot break Britain or Russia, she cannot break France or Italy, nor worst the Grand Alliance as a whole.

Let the Allies, at all temporary costs to any of them, endure for six months more, holding an unbroken line on all sides in Europe and everything else will come to them.

Now is the time to show that Germany can strike nowhere without being met and thwarted by the visible or invisible effects of British power.—J. L. Garvin, in the London, England, "Observer."
