MUSHROOM LOVERS UNITED BY EXPERT

Ontario Society Studies Economic Possibilities of Fungi—Millions Wasted But Danger Lurks

A Toronto journalist wrote: Dean of mushroom enthusiasts is Mr. W. B. Raymond, president of the Mycological Society of Ontario; a man who enjoys such a close friendship with 57 commonly found varieties of edible fungi that he hesitates not at all should the spirit move him to stoop, pluck a white or a tan or a beautifully pink mushroom as he walks the field and eats it on the spot—raw. The suggestion of such a feat would make the greatest daredevil among a gang of hero-worshipping small boys blanch with apprehension. Mr. Raymond has been twice poisoned in the pursuit of his pleasantly exciting hobby and tastes a new variety of fungus with circumspection.

For an entire summer Mr. Raymond used mushrooms as a staple article of diet. He is a chef extraordinaire when mushrooms are to be prepared, and from May until October of the summer in question his meat bill was practically nothing. At times he had as many as 38 varieties of the fungi in his refrigerator. Mr. Raymond strongly urges the use of mushrooms to supplant meat to a large extent. He quoted the statement of a scientist to show that the delicacies have as high as seven per cent. nitrogen value.

Must the Forests

He began the study of fungi about 1900 when he wanted a hobby which would take him out of doors. At that time he could not find another person in Toronto interested in the subject from a scientific standpoint. A few years later when the meeting to organize the Mycological Society was called, 50 enthusiasts responded. The purpose of the organization was to study edible and poisonous fungi, with special attention to mushroom and toadstool growths in regard to their economic features; their economic value and the injuries which they may bring to forests.

It has been discovered that thousands of trees are killed annually by bracket fungi which drain the life of the tree. This is to be combated. On the other hand, tons of edible mushrooms go to waste each year because there is not a sufficient demand to have them gathered. At one dollar or more per pound, which the housewife pays the grocer when she wishes to purchase the distinctively flavored umbrella formations, the economic loss is enormous.

Beware of These!

Woods and meadows abound with fungi, but beware the Amanita Muscaria with its insidious, fatal muscarine. Muscaria looks surprisingly like a harmless meadow mushroom which is quite edible. But the powerful alkaloid which it contains produces death. Likewise, do not become friendly with Amanita Phalloides, which contains the equally deadly amanitine.

The moral is this: Don't wander thither and yon by yourself, gathering in every attractive fungus convenient to you. Take along a competent person, and submit your specimens to him. Mr. Raymond ventured forth, collecting unaccompanied by anything except a textbook on his first trip. But he ate very sparingly of the fruits of his labors, and escaped poisoning.

CUCUMBERS AMONG CORN

Good Crop Harvested in Corn Field—How It's Done

William Johnson writes in the Maritime Farmer: In experimenting on a filler crop, I tried the cucumber vine with flint field corn. I planted cucumber seed every two or three hills at the time of planting corn; another section I planted the seed each two or three hills at the second time of going through with the cultivator, making a shallow hole with a pointed stick near the hill of corn and tamping the foot on same. I cultivated corn until it commenced to tassel, and was not bothered with the cucumber vines pulling up. At corn cutting time I found the cucumber vines 12 to 14 inches long and bearing one to two very fine cucumbers.

From seed planted at time of planting corn I harvested a splendid crop of yellow ripe cucumbers for making sweet pickle. From the other planting I harvested a crop of clean, crisp, green cucumbers, which for size would take a prize at the fair, and demand a good price in market at that time of year.

Novelist Starts Orchard

John Murray Gibbon, the novelist and C.P.R. publicity expert, for years owned a farm in British Columbia which he acquired when editor of a London weekly. He shipped a large quantity of Devonshire cider apple trees out there and soon expects to show Canada what real cider is like.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS. The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain Districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior. N.
