It would do your heart good to watch those mysterious torpedo boat destroyers scout g around, and to watch them shoot he is to-day with his skulking fleet. He is too careful to come out very far, as it would mean his defeat. Well, on going a little farther, you will notice the city of Cowes and the famous watering place and the summer resort for some of the notables of the wor'? a place where the Kaiser used to go with his whole family and out the country and find out all he could about England's strength at Southampton, one of the greatest harbors in the world, and one of the busiest places at the present time. It was a great relief to land once more on British soil, after having spent nearly nine months at the Dardanelles and in Egypt among all the diseases of the East. It did not take long to disembark the patients. Everything worked like clockwork. A .ter the patients were taken out we started to unload our material and load it on another boat, which we did quite willingly. After loadi g it, our sailing was cancelled on account of submarines in the English channel. Next day, however we got orders to sail, and pulled out. All kinds of things were included in our load, even a gun mounted on the after deck, and tons of ammunition under us petrol, and anti-aircraft guns. We got along fine, being escorted by destroyers to Le Havre, France, and after going through the locks we started to unload again on to a train. Next day we started for Bologne, where we are now stationed, running one of the best hospitals in this base. But. I must tell you we had to handle that load again, it being the nineteenth time. So you see war is not all sunshine. Well. I must close, as I am very tired after travelling so far in so short a time.

I have seen a little more since then, but as you know, Mr. Censorman has his eye on me as well as everybody else. Things seem to be going on about the same. As I sit here I can see take to the bar. We sometimes run across one another. We had an issue of things from the Red Cross the other day, and as luck would have it, and it seemed quite a coincidence, I got a pair of socks with a note in them from Mrs. H. McDonald, Upper Town, Durham. I am writing her at the same time. I did not know of any others from there, but I was surprised to get a pair from the old town. And that is one thing the boys can do-use socks. They can't get too many. I guess I must close now. The other Durham boys are o.k., that is, Jack Weir and Percy Bryon.
