Their physical handicap is being so reduced, and so many avenues of new industry are being opened for those who cannot resume their old work, that their success will now depend largely on their own will and energy, though these must be backed up vigorously by Governments and individual citizens with offers and organization of

suitable employment. The French, with far larger number to provide for, have gone further than ourselves, - for example, in training argriculturists for a successful return to argriculture, and in preparing the better educated to enter the teaching

profession. They have also organized a great toy making industry, which, it is hoped will prevent the cheap toy-trade from again into the hands of
