SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may hereinafter a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions. Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may preempt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Six months' residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain Districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

THREE-MAN CONTROL WITH PREMIER STRONG

Radical Changes in British Constitutional Practice—Many Business Men in New Ministry

London despatches said: The official list of the new Ministry follows the unofficial forecasts with two or three minor changes. Lloyd-George, Lord Milner, Earl Curzon, Andrew Bonar Law and Arthur Henderson form what is officially termed the War Cabinet, while the others, who ordinarily have been designated as Cabinet Ministers, are called heads of departments. An important point in the novel organization is that it concentrates far more power in the hands of the Prime Minister than the British system has ever known before. Mr. Lloyd-George's proposals to Premier Asquith were for a War Council, of which the Premier should not be a member, although he should have the power of passing on its work.

Daily Cabinet for War The War Cabinet will hold daily sessions, directing the prosecution of the war, and the freedom of Mr. Lloyd-George, Lord Milner and Mr. Henderson from departmental duties will allow them to devote all their time to the War Council. The work of the Exchequer and leadership in the Commons will absorb most of Mr. Bonar Law's time, and attendance on the Lords will necessitate Earl Curzon's absence from the Council frequently. So that Mr. Lloyd-George, Lord Milner and Mr. Henderson will be the chief directors of the war.

The Great Executives The complexion of the new Government is 12 Liberals, 15 Unionists, 3 Laborites and the Presidents of the Boards of Trade and Education and the shipping controller, who have been attached to no parties. The most important new officials are the food and shipping controllers. Baron Devonport has been named manager of the port of London, a post requiring first-rate business ability, and Sir Joseph MacLay is one of the great Scottish ship-owners. Business is further represented by Baron Rhonda, who is a coal mining magnate, at the Local Government Board; by Sir Albert Stanley; at the Board of Trade; and Sir Alfred Mond, a manufacturer, as Commissioner of Works, and also by Sir Frederick Cawley and Albert Illingworth.

MILL FIRE KILLS MANY

At Peterboro's Quaker Oats Plant—\$2,000,000 Loss Follows Explosion

Fire, following an explosion which was believed due to spontaneous combustion, rushed through the Quaker Oats mill at Peterboro, Ont., on Monday and spread to the Court House. Probably sixteen deaths resulted; five were left unlikely to recover and ten others lie in a more or less serious condition. Over four hundred were at work in the mill at the time and many escapes seemed miraculous. The damage being about \$2,000,000. Firemen were able to save part of the Court House. Great concrete elevators beside the mill were saved. Crowded with case goods for the war the mill was a rich prey to the flames. It was the largest mill of its kind in Canada. The following is the list of known victims of the fire: The known dead—Edward Howley, killed by the explosion; married; most of family grown up. Vincent Fornale, died immediately upon reaching hospital. Dominic Martino, wife in Italy. Fred Holden, died from severe burns. Missing (probably dead)—Wm. Mesley, married, with one son returned from the front; Jas. W. Gordon, Jas. Foster, Ernest Staunton, Denis O'Brien, married, with six children; Alex. McGee, Wm. Hogan, Thos. Parsons, Daniel Nichols, Wilber Kemp, Wm. Miles and John Conway.

CENTRALIZE EMPIRE

With Canada as Senior Partner—Baron Shaughnessy's Views

Returning from England last week Lord Shaughnessy said: "The imperial spirit now is the keynote of British effort. Britain's forges are burning fiercely, creating steel chains by which her integral parts will be bound together as never before. It has been her boast for years that only a silken cord connected the mother country with her overseas dominions and colonies. That time has past. The war has demonstrated that unity of effort and the direction must continue." "Canadians," he asserted, "have won a name which will forever distinguish them. Never will they be confused with other nationalities on this continent. Canada will, in fact, be a senior partner of the British Empire, bearing an equal share of the burdens, reaping a proportionate share of the profits and filling a prominent seat at the council table." Concerning Canada's internal development, Lord Shaughnessy said: "The war has only hastened it. Before the war, immigration was rapid, but not a measure to what it will be when the peace is declared."

Wants Empire Council

New Zealand Premier Would Extend Power of Overseas Statesmen

Premier Massey of New Zealand, in an interview on Saturday said that admission to the Cabinet for dominion statesmen was a great point gained, but the dominions would not accept as final any proposed restricting of their representatives to merely advisory members. There should be an empire council, the precise constitution of which should be decided by an Imperial conference held with the least possible delay. The council should have the power to deal with the practical problems of Imperial defence, food, raw material and supply.

Foe Admit Big Air Loss

The German war office issued a statement on aerial fighting during November. It admits that the Germans lost 31 machines on all fronts.
