BRITISH ATTACK KUT

Carefully-prepared Offensive Meets With Sudden Success

A London despatch on Monday said: The British army on the Tigris front, which assumed the offensive last Wednesday, has made a further advance. An official statement given out here yesterday says the British are now within three-quarters of a mile of the Tigris opposite Kut-el-Amara.

Earlier despatches said: British troops have taken the offensive in the region of Kut-el-Amara, in Mesopotamia, and have occupied Turkish positions on the Hai River, south of Cut-el-Amara, says an official statement issued last week. In the offensive movement the British crossed to the right bank of the Hai River and took Turkish trenches near Kala Haji Fahan, two and a half miles from Kutel-Amara. Major-Gen. Maude, who was some years ago on the staff of the Governor-General at Ottawa, commands the British forces in Mesopotamia, where during the past hot season elaborate preparations for an advance were under way.
