FIRST ANAESTHETIC USED "SHAM OFFERS"; HUN PEACE MOVE SPURNED

Chloroform Was Discovered in 1848—Whose Honor? Sir James Simpson, Professor of Midwifery in the Chair of Edinburgh University, if not actually the discoverer of chloroform, was, at any rate, the first to introduce its employment as an anesthetic into surgical practice. This was in 1848. Previously all operations were performed without anaesthetics, the patient being drugged with whisky and held down by strong men while the operation was performed. No medical discovery ever did more to alleviate human suffering.

Tricks of the Green Man Those who have seen films in which a player taking two parts appears in those parts at one and the same time, in the same scene, will wonder how it is done. The player, of course, does not play both parts at once. He, or she, plays one part, and while doing so the camera operator, by one of his many tricks, keeps blank that portion of the film on which the player is photographed taking his other part. When that part in which he winds back the film to the beginning, and the unexposed blank portion is exposed for the first time, while the other part is covered. Then the player takes the other part.

Filling the Radiator It not infrequently happens with the motorist that when an empty radiator is filled up and the car runs a short distance, the water level will be found to have fallen considerably, though no overheating has occurred and no leak exists. The reason for this is that the water requires some little time to percolate through the various restricted passages in the cooling system, and a little shaking down results in a falling of the level.

Ontario's Hydro Voting In Ontario on Monday hydro-electric by-laws were carried in all northern towns and in all western towns except Goderich. Hydro-radial by-laws carried most places, including Toronto and St. Catharines, but were defeated in Hamilton. By-laws favoring the Chippewa Creek power scheme carried everywhere.

Will Save the Small "In reality these overtures made by the Central Powers are nothing more than a calculated attempt to influence the future course of war, and to do it by imposing a German peace. The object of these overtures is to create the dissension in public opinion of the allied nations. Fully conscious of the gravity of this moment, but equally conscious of the requirements, the allied Governments, closely united to one another, and in perfect sympathy with their peoples, refuse to consider a proposal which is empty and insincere.

"Once again the allies declare that no peace is possible so long as they have not secured reparation for violated rights and liberties, the recognition of the principle of nationalities and of the free existence of small States; so long as they have not brought about a settlement calculated to end once and for all the menace which has constituted a perpetual menace to the nations, and to afford the only effective guarantee for the future security of the world. At this very moment, while Germany is proclaiming peace and humanity to the world, she is deporting Belgian citizens by thousands and reducing them to slavery."

Belgium Unforgettable "Belgium was invaded by an Empire which had guaranteed her nationality and which had the assurance to proclaim that treaties were 'scraps of paper,' and that 'necessity knows no law.' At the present moment these sham offers on the part of Germany rest on the 'war map' of Europe, which presents nothing more than a superficial and passing phase of the situation and not the real strength of the belligerents. A peace concluded upon these terms would be only to the advantage of the aggressors, who, after imagining that they would reach their goal in two months, discovered after two years that they could never attain it. As for the future, the disasters caused by the German declaration of war and the innumerable outrages committed by Germany and her allies against both belligerents and neutrals demand penalties, reparation and guarantees. Germany avoids mention of any of these.
