RANGER'S INVENTION

Spiral Ladder Round Tree Serves For Lookout Station

On the summit of Brush Mountain in the Crater National Forest of southern Oregon, the top of a tall fir tree is used as a lookout station by a ranger who patrols the woods and is on a constant vigil for fires. In establishing his observatory, the man constructed a spiral ladder which winds about the trunk and extends to the uppermost part of the great tree. He did the work unassisted, and in a staunch and durable manner. The rungs of the ladder consist of heavy yew pegs driven into 2-inch auger holes, spaced at regular intervals and hored 1 foot deep into the tree. REORGANIZE CANADIANS

The scheme of co-ordinating the training of Canadians in England with the requirements in France is proceeding satisfactorily. Officers from corps and divisional schools have been transferred by the general staff to England, and many of them are specialists in certain lines of instruction. The Canadian military schools at Shorncliffe is being re-organized. Special instructions is now given to all men proceeding to France. A list has been compiled throughout all the Canadian centres in England of men fit for active service. Such will be replaced by unfit men and others incapacitated at the front.

GREECE'S LAST WARNING

King Constantine Quibbles-Entente to Reply Imperatively

The London Times said last Saturday: "We understand the Allied Governments are not satisfied with the Greek reply to the ultimatum. It reveals a tendency to play for time and evade several points which the ultimatum insisted on. It attempts to establish conditions where an unconditional compliance was demanded, and expressed an inadmissable desire that the blockade shall be raised. With regard to the release of the imprisoned Venizelists, the reply is not only unsatisfactory, but puts forward a counter-claim. Therefore it is expected that Constantine's Government will be promptly informed that a definite acquiescence in the terms of the ultimatum is imperative. Failing this acquiescence, the situation is likely to be dealt with by General Sarrail in accordance with the evigencies of the local situation."

If a Government action is necessary to prevent suffering in the prairies and to keep the smelters supplied with coke, action will undoubtedly be firm and vigorous. In view of the financial strength of the mine owners, Government action, if found necessary, will no doubt be carried out at the expense of the operators. This radical proposal was annaunced in an official statement issued by the Dominion Government on Sunday in connection with the strike trouble at the Fernie coal mines. Government operation of these mines now seems certain. The operators have refused to grant the men an increase in

London despatches on Sunday said: Canadian millers have not succeeded in securing any modification in the regulations of the British Government which has checked the import of flour from Canada. Sir George Foster, who has been dealing with the British Government says that the problem is an exceedingly difficult one and it is doubtful if the Canadian millers will be able to secure any concessions just now.
